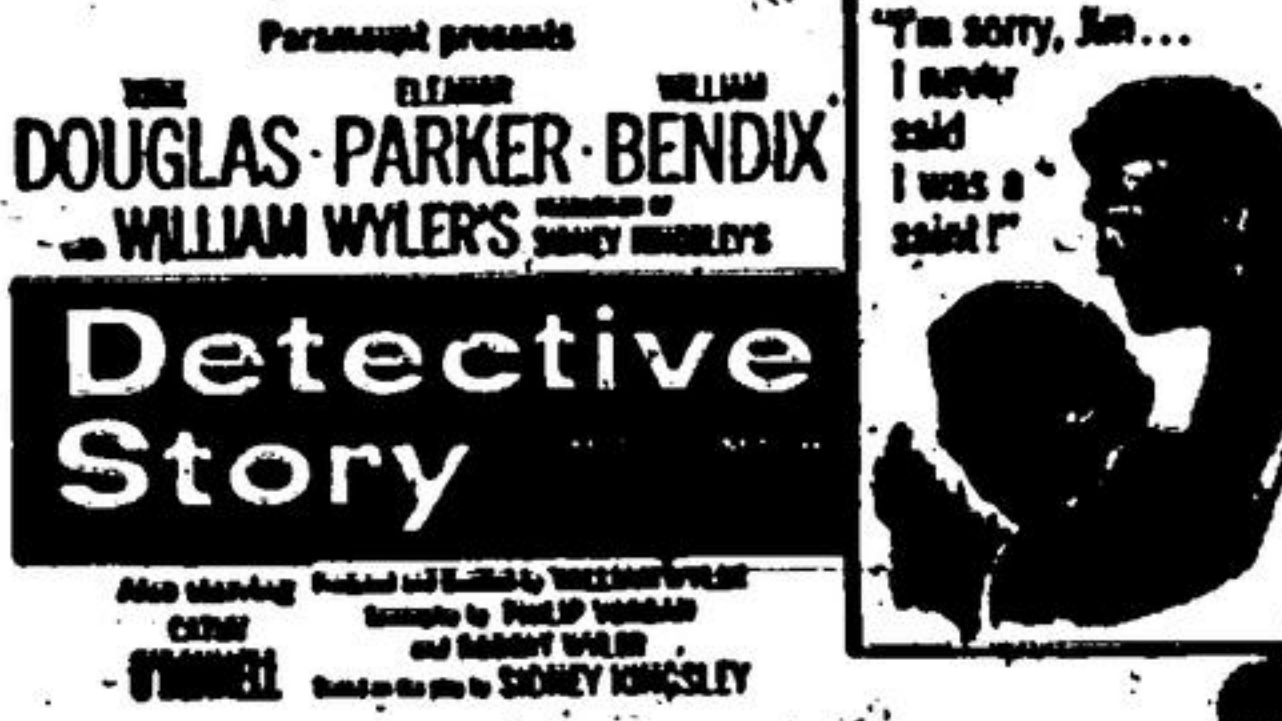

Historical Research is Institute Meeting Theme

The regular monthly meeting of the Georgetown Women's Institute was held at the home of Mrs. F. D. McNally, Market Street, on Wednesday evening, January 2nd with the president, Mrs. Seward Wilson in the chair. The spirit of the New Year was brought very much to the attention of the members by the singing of a New Year hymn of dedication and a New Year prayer. The motto, too, was in keeping with the time of year, being "We treasure the past, we face the future." The roll call was answered by a geographical Indian name, and it was found that Halton county had honoured our native Canadians many times in its selection of Indian names. It might be of interest to know that the house formerly owned by the late Mr. John McDonald, situated on Queen Street where Mr. and Mrs. Ed Hall and Mr. and Mrs. George Martin now live, bears an Indian name, Illahee, meaning "our home." The report on the Christmas hampers and cheer was given. It was decided to send \$5.00 donation to the Hospital for Sick Children.

Mrs. Velma Norris, district convener of Historical Research, was introduced by Mrs. J. C. Bailey local convener of Historical Research, who had charge of this part of the meeting. Contrary to expectations Mrs. Norris did not deal with local history but chose a far wider field for her subject. Many interesting facts were disclosed and many useful suggestions offered to make our branch, our town and our country the better of our citizenship. She said, in part — to appreciate music, join in a sing-song and be one of the party. It adds much to the spirit of the gathering. International goodwill began at home — our attitude toward the newcomers to Canada. Spoke of the first woolen mill in Canada being situated near Georgetown. Spoke of the discovery of butter — a herdsman riding across a hot desert with a goat skin of milk and upon opening it found a golden ball. This was over two thousand years ago. Spoke of tea as a beverage, known nearly six thousand years ago. A Chinese philosopher had said of it as a beverage "It does not cause intoxication nor cause man to say foolish things." We speak with horror about car fatalities but in by-gone days it had been buggy fatalities and they had been alarming too. Spoke of salt and its uses, many of which were not very well known, quoted several, one of which was a small bag hung inside the wind-shield of a car and applied at intervals to glass on cold nights would keep it frost-free. He was rushed to Toronto General Hospital where the broken jaw was set. Pete also lost four teeth in the accident. He will be in hospital for at least another week.

Georgetown lost their first game of the new year here last Saturday, when Elmira won 7-5. Two home games are slated this week. Walkerton on Saturday and Elmira on Tuesday. A benefit game is being planned, probably with Milton, to help defray the heavy expenses of Ward's accident.
