### Had Farm Here Mrs. Mason Dies

Dorothy Kingsford Mason, wife of Col. Douglas H. C. Mason, died on January 7th at her home, 6 Clarendon Avenue, Toronto. She had been ill for the past year.

A daughter of the late Magistrate Rupert E. Kingsford, Mrs. Mason received her education at Havergal College and St. Vincent de Paul Convent, Brussels, Belgium. She was noted as an athlete at Havergal. During the first World War she was engaged in munitions work and in the second war in general engineering.

Mrs. Mason was widely known as a Jersey cattle breeder and the winner of three grand championships. She was keenly interested in gardening, music and photography. She was a member of Grace Church-on-the-Hill, the Chancel Guild and the Women's Guild. She was also a member of the Toronto Ladies

### Club and the Toronto Golf-Club.

From 1926 to 1940 the Masons lived at Baronston Farm on the Check Line near Georgetown, selling their property to D. R. McLaughlin who now calls the beautiful property Miradon Farm.

She leaves her husband, two sons John and Anthony, a daughter Elizabeth, three brothers, George E. Kingsford, Toronto, Major W. R. Kingsford, Mexico City and Rev. Maurice Kingsford in England, and two sisters, Lucy Kingsford and Mrs. John Law, both of Ottawa.

The funeral service took place in Grace Church-on-the-Hill on Thursday and interment was made in Mount Pleasant Cemetery, Toronto.

Mrs. Wood is survived by five children, Louvaine, Mrs. A. Robinson of Hamilton, Evelyn, Mrs. Jack Saunders, Ethel, Mrs. Harold Schenk, Jean, Mrs. Murray Robertson, and James Wood of Georgetown and eleven grandchildren, Diane, Sandra and Allana Robinson, Jane Schenk, Gary and Mary Lou Robertson, Wendy, Jack, Linda, Larry and Bonnie Saunders. Also surviving are three brothers and three sisters Mrs. Daisy Newlands, Mrs. Florence Bouskill, William and Frederick Bullivant of Georgetown, Thomas Bullivant of Hamilton and Mrs. Alice Wright, Toronto. One sister predeceased her, Mrs. Louisa Errington.

The funeral service last Tuesday was conducted in St. George's Church by Archdeacon W. G. O. Thompson. Pallbearers were Arthur and Isaac Bullivant, Hamilton, Harry and Verdun Wright, Toronto, David Wood and Rupert Beaumont.

Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.
