CO-OPS HERE SATURDAY FOR WARD BENEFIT GAME

Milton Co-Ops will be here this Saturday, playing the Raiders in a benefit game for Pete Ward, seriously injured at hockey practice earlier this month. Pete, a Three Rivers, Quebec, defenseman who came to town this season via Slimco, suffered a broken jaw and lost four teeth in the accident. He was released from Toronto General Hospital on Monday, but it will be several weeks before he is past the convalescent stage.

Saturday's game will be the third meeting of Milton and Georgetown this hockey season. The Co-Ops, who won the league championship from Raiders last year, were boosted to Intermediate A this year and play in a league with Brampton, Dundas, Woodbridge, Oakville and Burlington. They beat Georgetown 6-4 in one exhibition game, and tied a game here 6-6.

Many of the visitors are familiar to Georgetown sports fans, and several have played in Georgetown uniforms in past years, including Chuck Currie and Melanson. Also in the Milton line-up are Russ Brush, Linton, Fox, Heipel, Townsley (also with the Raiders last year), Grenke and Bayliss and Scatlton. And of course, Doney Evans, who has tended goal for both Acton and Georgetown at various times in his hockey career.

Special tickets are being sold by hockey club members for the game, with a number of prizes offered in a lucky draw. These include donations of a radio by McClure's Home Furnishings, cosmetic set by MacCormack's Drugs, ten grease jobs by Bowers Motor Sales, a gallon of oil by Lane's Haulage, a Herald subscription, and two hockey tickets. It is hoped that no one will turn down a donation to help pay medical bills for this young hockey player.

A special feature at the game will be the Lorne Scots Band, which has also donated its services for the night.

TWO IN HOSPITAL HIGHWAY SMASH

In a blinding snowstorm early Saturday evening, two people were injured in a crash on Laird's Hill at Norval, eight cars were damaged and traffic tangled for more than two hours.

Cars driven by Royal Salisbury of Brampton and Russell Taylor of Lansing collided on the slippery curve halfway down the hill. Taylor and his passenger, Joyce Storey of Toronto were taken to Peel Memorial Hospital with severe facial cuts and leg injuries. Len Briffant, Brampton, a passenger in the other car was treated at the scene for forehead cuts.

Before the highway was cleared six more cars had piled into the ditches and into each other as their drivers sought to avoid collisions on the hill. An erroneous report spread through town that three people had been killed in the crash.

About the same time, a car driven by Clem Lusty, skidded on the McNabb Street hill curve onto John Street, and plunged over the sidewalk into the river flats. The car rolled over and landed upside down. Luckily Mr. Lusty and his passengers were uninjured.
