## Norval Groups Propose Building Community Hall

A special meeting of the Committee appointed by the Local Association of Girl Guides and the Group Committee of Boy Scouts in Norval, was held at the home of Mrs. E. C. Reed on Tuesday morning, January 18th, with Mrs. Reed presiding. Mrs. Reed explained that the purpose of this meeting was to investigate a proposal put forward by several community groups in Norval as to the possibility of erecting a Community Hall on the recreation grounds. It was decided to present the following brief to the Norval Recreation Committee:

"A survey to explore the possibilities of building a recreation hall on the recreation grounds to be used as a meeting place for community organizations such as the Women's Institute, Scouts, Guides, Brownies, Cubs, Junior Farmers, St. John Ambulance Course, etc.

Inasmuch as these are community organizations and independent

of any church organization, it is unfair to expect any one Church to bear the expense of providing a meeting place.

"Inasmuch as these are community organizations, it is the responsibility of the whole community to provide a meeting place for such groups as these which play such an important part in community life.

"The Recreation grounds as they stand do not meet the needs of the community. No facilities are provided for the recreation of older people. We are thinking of the good purposes that the old Orange Hall once served.

"Such a Hall would be a gymnasium which could be used for basketball, badminton, shuffle-board, and other indoor court games suitable for old and young alike.

"We feel that the Recreation Committee should consider this proposal and suggest that the members of this community at this meeting tonight

be asked their opinion.

"We further suggest that a sub-committee be appointed by the Recreation Committee to investigate the possibility of financing the project and report back within a month from this date.

"We respectfully submit this request, inasmuch as many community groups are awaiting a decision.

"We feel that the Recreation Committee has not had the interests of the community as a whole, under its present set-up and that this proposal would be a means whereby everyone in the community would have an interest in the work of the Recreation Committee and its facilities.

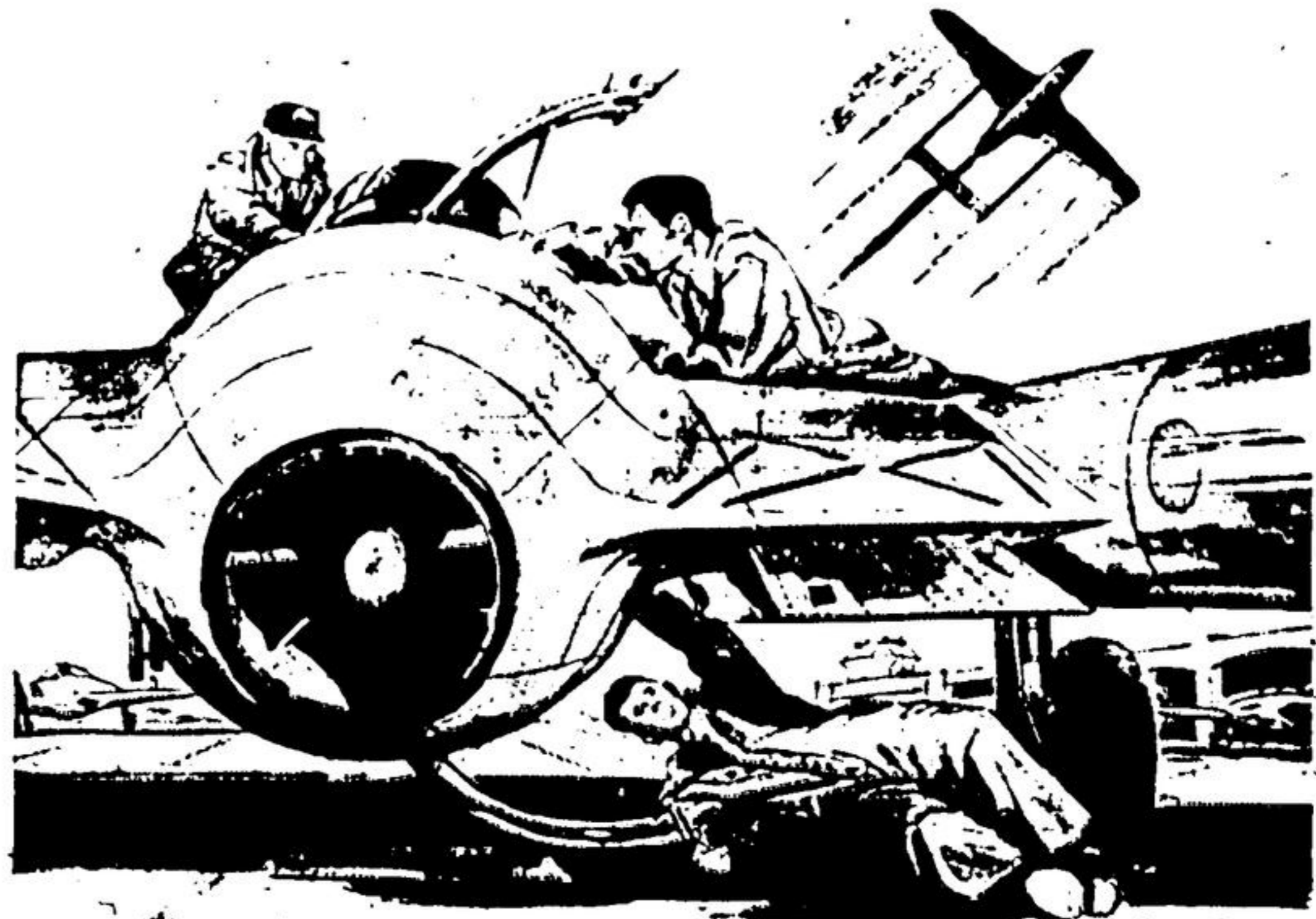
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
