### NEW BOOKS AT THE LIBRARY

#### TEMPEST-TOSSED

by Robertson Davies

Mr. Davies who in private life is the editor of the Peterborough Examiner, is one of the very few Canadian writers whose reputation extends beyond the bounds of his native land. His first novel, *Tempest-Tossed*, should still further enhance his reputation. It is by no means the great Canadian novel but it is clever, witty, well-written and unmistakably Canadian. Instead of a pallid imitation of British or United States models.

The story is woven around the Salterton Little Theatre Group's ambitious determination to stage an open air production of Shakespeare's *Tempest*. Anyone who has been even a mild dabbler in amateur theatricals will chortle over the pitfalls and difficulties that beset the oddly-assorted adventurers in *Art*. There are the usual important people who have to be tactfully handled and whose volatile energies and ambitions must be sublimated into appropriate channels. But one of them, Hector MacKilwraith, head of the Maths Department at the local collegiate gets rather out of hand. At the age of forty and after having administered the group's finances brilliantly for many years, he suddenly insists on being given an active part. And then for the first time since he was twenty-one he falls in love. It makes quite a panic for all concerned.

Mr. Davies' gift for satire displays itself in such passages as the following, where Mr. MacKilwraith is first toying with the idea of acting.

"Hector's acquaintance with the works of Shakespeare was not extensive. When at school himself he had been compelled to read and answer questions about Julius Caesar, Macbeth and Henry V, owing to some fold or tremor in the curriculum he had been compelled to spend two years upon this latter play. In his mind these plays were lumped together with *Hiawatha*, *The Lay of the Last Minstrel* and *Sohrab and Rustum* as "literature" that is to say ambiguous and unsupported assertions by men of letters. He very rarely read a book which was not about mathematics or how to teach mathematics. He subscribed to the *American Mathematical Monthly*, he read newspapers and news magazines, and occasionally he relaxed with the *Reader's Digest*, for he had a taste for amateur doctoring and liked to ponder over the miraculous drugs and therapeutic methods described therein."

The first few and the last few pages are apparently an attempt to achieve artistic unity but can be perhaps safely skimmed over without serious loss.

#### BARABBAS

by Par Lagerkvist

translated from the Swedish  
This is current winner of the Nobel Prize for Literature. The story begins with the Crucifixion on Golgotha. Standing apart and watching for some reason he cannot understand is the violent bandit and murderer released by Pilate at the request of the mob.

On the few historical materials available Par Lagerkvist has reconstructed a picture of the infamous Barabbas. It is not a glossed-over or whitewashed characterization but the portrait of a living human being who has been caught in the current of events he cannot understand.

The story traces his career from the dens of Jerusalem and the labour of the Cyprian copper mines to the final scenes at Rome, when the blundering broken old slave who is Barabbas misunderstands the teaching of the crucified Rabbi and unwittingly delivers the Apostle Peter and a company of believers to the torturers of Nero.

The heroine is a beautiful Welsh princess who is willing to sacrifice her all — sometimes for her religion, other times for the hero. There are cruel, ruthless, cunning enemies; scheming females; battles, duels, tortures and more battles. But it all adds up to a furious and hair-raising evening's entertainment.

by H. E. Bates  
The work of this English writer is not too well-known on this side of the water but such a competent critic as Somerset Maugham rates him at the top of the list of modern short story writers. Mr. Bates writes in the manner of the realistic school in Orillia, but without its excesses or crudities. The stories cover a wide variety of scenes and characters and the method of approach displays amazing versatility.
