CHRISTMAS SEAL DONATIONS ALMOST DOUBLE LAST YEAR

Total subscriptions in Halton to the Christmas Seal campaign were reported as \$7877 at a meeting at Hawthorne Lodge last week of Halton Tuberculosis and Health Association.

The campaign was the first undertaken by the new association. Previously Oakville Lions Club had handled the campaign. Last year's gross returns were \$4515. People of Georgetown district gave donations totalling \$730. The books of the organization are being kept open a few weeks longer, as it is hoped to double last year's figure in order to carry out an extensive program of TB control in the county this year.

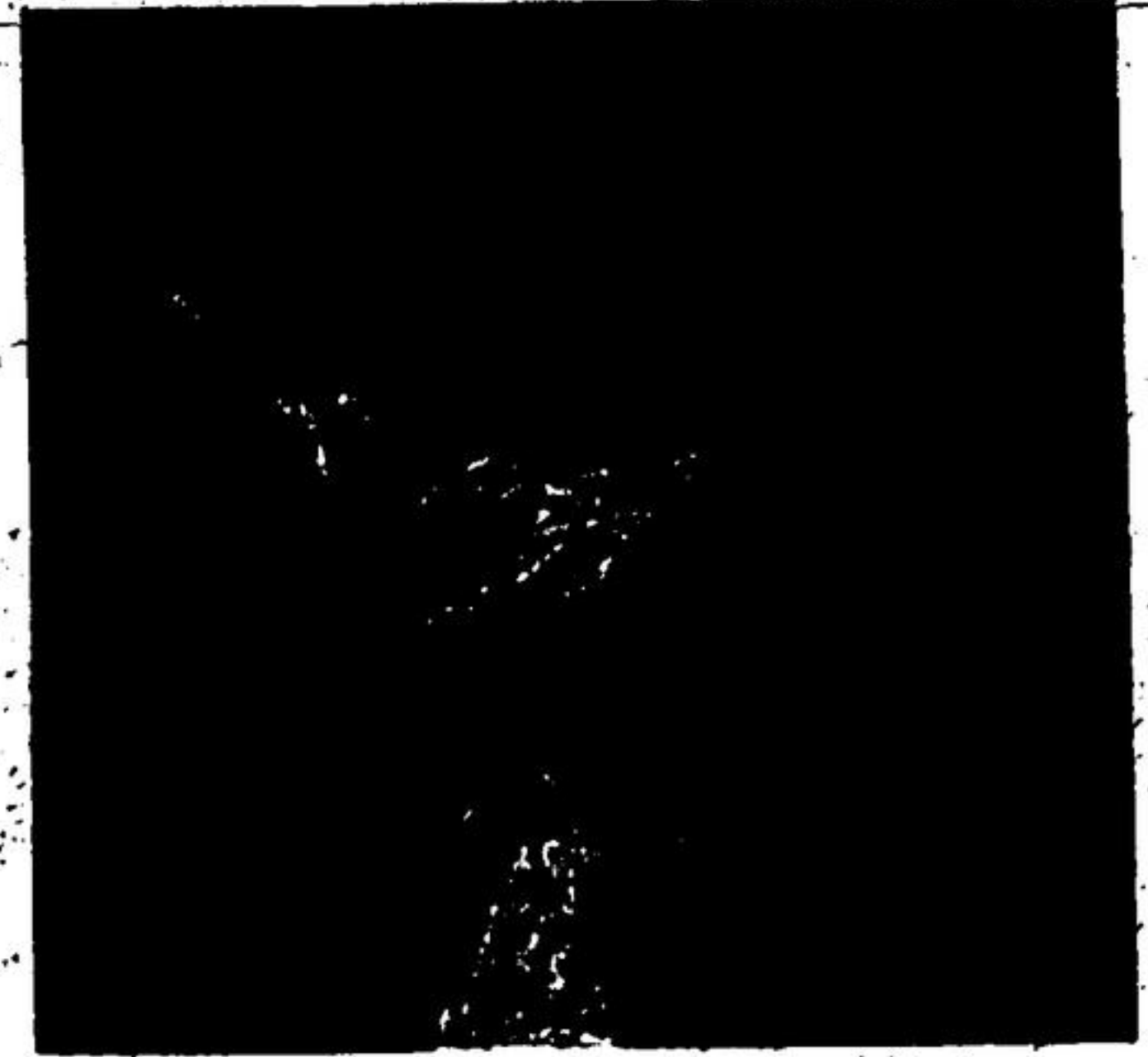

If possible, the clinic will be arranged so that the equipment will stop at major manufacturing plants, in order to x-ray all employees at one time, rather than having them come to a central clinic.

Dr. Joe Lee, of Mountain Sanatorium staff, was hired as a consultant at the Oakville Chest Clinic. Dr. Lee will attend clinics there half a day each month. At present this is the only clinic held in the county and serves people in that area. People from Burlington are sent to clinics in Hamilton and the north Halton residents attend clinics at Guelph.
