

Acton Minister Speaks To St. John's W.M.S.

A supper meeting was arranged by the Woman's Missionary Society of St. John's United Church for their February meeting. On February 5th at 6.30 members of the WMS and their friends met in the Memorial Hall where a delicious supper was served. The tables were prettily decorated with daffodils, silver candlesticks and white candles. Mrs. Robert Jones, the new president, was in the chair, assisted by her first vice president, Mrs. Gordon Kidney. Mrs. E. Groszinsky, (better known to us as Mrs. Gray) was in charge of the devotional. She had been reading a book by Dr. Peter Marshall called "Mr. Jones, meet the Master." Mrs. Jones thought she could not do better than give a synopsis of one of the chapters. It was

the story of Mary Magdalene. Mrs. Jones told of how this woman of the streets had followed the crowd around Christ and been changed by Jesus and became one of his devoted followers. Her gratitude led her to pour the contents of her costly alabaster box of ointment on his feet and wipe them with the hair of her head. Thus she poured out her all, in gratitude and Christ defended her before the criticism of Judas Iscariot and the Pharisees. Appropriate hymns were sung at intervals and Mrs. Jones closed with prayer. An special speaker for the evening, Rev. Eldridge Currey of Acton United Church addressed the meeting. He gave very reassuring answers to the expressed doubts of people, even of members of his W.M.S. Are Christian missions to "foreign countries" justified? He said, we did not need to justify

them for Christ had justified them. Did not he say — "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel and Lo, I am with you always even unto the end of the world."

Mr. Currey showed the ladies splendid pictures which he had taken as one of the padres during this last war. Mrs. Currey assisted him in showing these. There were pictures of Canadian cemeteries overseas, of churches and cathedrals, of destruction, caused by the war and showed us that if we did not work devotedly for Christian Missions chaos would surely follow. Christ said "All power is given unto me, in heaven and on earth."

The program of music added very much to the pleasure of the evening. Jean Harley sang beautifully, several sacred songs. Mrs. J. L. Barber and Mr. Albert Tost played some piano duets in harmony with the other numbers on the program.

Mrs. A. M. Nielsen moved a very appreciative vote of thanks to all who had taken part on the program and to those who had prepared and served the supper. The meeting was brought to a close by the singing of hymn 557—"The Day is past and over, all thanks, O Lord to Thee."

FARM NEWS

HALTON TOPS IN GRADE A BACON

The annual summary just released by the Ont. Live Stock Branch reveals that Halton is tied with Waterloo in leading the Province in the production of Grade A hogs. In 1951 Halton producers marketed 20,074 hogs with 41 per cent Grade A's. This is quite an achievement but when one learns that one of our Esquimaux producers who marketed well over 150 hogs during the year had between 82 and 83 Grade A's, the county achievement is not, perhaps, as great as appears on the surface. Halton's production was up 6.3 per cent over the previous year. Ontario maintained her position as Canada's premier producing hog province. Her marketings in 1951 represent nearly 42 per cent of the total marketings for Canada. Eastern Canada produced slightly over two-thirds of the hogs marketed. It will be recalled that in 1944 we exported nearly 696 million pounds of bacon, all to Great Britain. In 1951, just seven years later, our total exports of bacon were slightly less than 22 million pounds and this went to the United States.
