TERRA COTTA

Farmers Club Hears Of European Trip

Bob Cooper, who had a narrow escape from death in a plane crash in Italy last month, described his experiences overseas to members of Terra Cotta farmers club at their meeting Monday at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Lyons.

Mr. Cooper, a Brampton district resident was herdman for an air shipment of registered Holsteins destined for the farm of an Italian count. He described the flight from Malton, with stops at Gander, Newfoundland, Shannon, and Frankfurt, Germany, and the uncharted stop at Pisa, Italy, where the plane crashed and burst into flames, killing most of the livestock aboard. Luckily Mr. Cooper and the plane crew escaped uninjured. He showed the group a miniature of the Leaning Tower of Pisa, one of the seven wonders of the world, which he had purchased during his enforced stay there.

Frank Asbeck, also recently returned from Europe, told briefly of his visit in his native land, Germany, and promised to give more details of conditions there at the next meeting.

Community singing was led by Mrs. John McClure and Mrs. Fraser Macdonald gave a reading. The hostess was assisted by Mrs. A. Dolson and Mrs. H. S. Leslie in serving lunch. Next month's meeting is at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Willert Cleave.
