Fair Board Plans Building in Park

After considerable preliminary work on the part of the directors of the Equine Agricultural Society, they are now prepared to start the erection of a building in the park to house livestock on fair day and to be used for storage space during the balance of the year. Permission had already been secured by council of two years ago as to site of this building.

The building will be of aluminum construction, similar to that on Milton fair grounds, and will be an asset to the park when completed. While the financial objective has not all been reached, it is taken that a further drive for funds to complete the project will be launched in the near future.
