(2) Any Women's Organized Group e.g. Women's Institute, I.O.D.E., Women's Auxiliary, etc., may compete as an individual in classes 23, 24, 25, 27. Prize money to go to group Treasury. In case of no competition, unless work is worthy, prizes will be withheld.

Judges in this Department are authorized by the Board of this Society to discard all soiled, defaced or old work
