FARM NEWS

#### Liquid Fertilizers Again In the Public Eye

In recent weeks, salesmen have been making farm to farm visits attempting to sell liquid fertilizers. We have no idea how many of our farmer friends "fell" for the smooth sales talk. In view of this high pressure campaign it is of interest to note a recent release by the Advisory Fertilizer Board of Ontario. The statement of the Board is as follows: "While liquid fertilizers may be very effective for house plants, greenhouses, intensive garden production, or side dressing. it does not give significant increases in yields or germination of field crops and is not recommended for these latter crops." This statement is based on the results of tests which were carried out by the Field Husbandry Department at the Ontario Agricultural College over the past two years. The Board also states that the results of the Guelph tests are in harmony with those reported by the Experimental Farms Service, and in view of the results, have agreed that no further experimental work on seed treatment with liquid fertilizer would need to be conducted. For those who wish to use liquid fertilizer for house plants, side dressing, etc., may we suggest that they secure a copy of Bulletin No. 463 .. "Soil Management and Fertilizer Use." In this bulletin will be found recommendations for the making and the use of such fertilizer solutions. Copies of the bulletin in question can be obtained at the Milton office of the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

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## Spring Meeting Federated Institutes Held at O.A.C.

The Spring hieoting of the Board of Directors of the Federated Women's Institutes of Ontario was held at the Ontario Agricultural College for three days prior to the annual conference of the Institute on May 1st and 2nd. Mrs. R. G. Purcell of Fort William, the provincial president, was in the chair. In her opening remarks Mrs. Purcell said that some of the recognized leaders in world affairs and peace movements believe the chief stumbling block and difficulty of this age is that men and governments place too much emphasis on the material things instead of the spiritual aspects of life without enough emphasis on the magical force of brotherly love which is the heart beat of all religions. Mrs. Purcell said that the outstanding project of the year was the Tractor and Flour Fund for Greece for which over \$7400 was collected and thus the Institute was able to send a fully-equipped tractor and food to Athens.

Mrs. J. R. Futcher, Resolution Convener, reported that action had been taken with the Canadian Food Processors Association in the request to have fruit, vegetable jusces and unfrozen concentrated juices canned in small sized containers for the use of children; and that progress had been made with the Canadian Retail Federation of Merchants in having wire staple closing abolished on food parcels.

#### CANADIANS PASS ENGLISH EXAMS

Four new Canadians taking the special night school classes at the high school wrote their English and Citizenship exams recently and all were successful in passing.

The English classes, offered locally for the first time this year under the direction of North Halton high school district board, proved very popular. Over fifty men and women registered, and there was an average attendance of over 30 at each of the classes which were held from November to April.

Classes had formerly been given by the school board in Milton and Acton. This year, it was decided to try them in Georgetown and the enrolment was so heavy at the start that a third teacher was necessary for a short time when enrolment was at a peak. Principal J. L. Lam's bert taught the advanced class and Miss Plorence Luke the beginners, while Mrs. P. W. Cleave, a former member of the high school staff, was third teacher when needed.

The four who received certificates were Ken Jensen of Georgetown, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Van der Gaast of Norval and Thys Van der Gaart, Belfountain. Students were predominantly Dutch and Danish, and Italy, Germany and Austria were other countries represented


