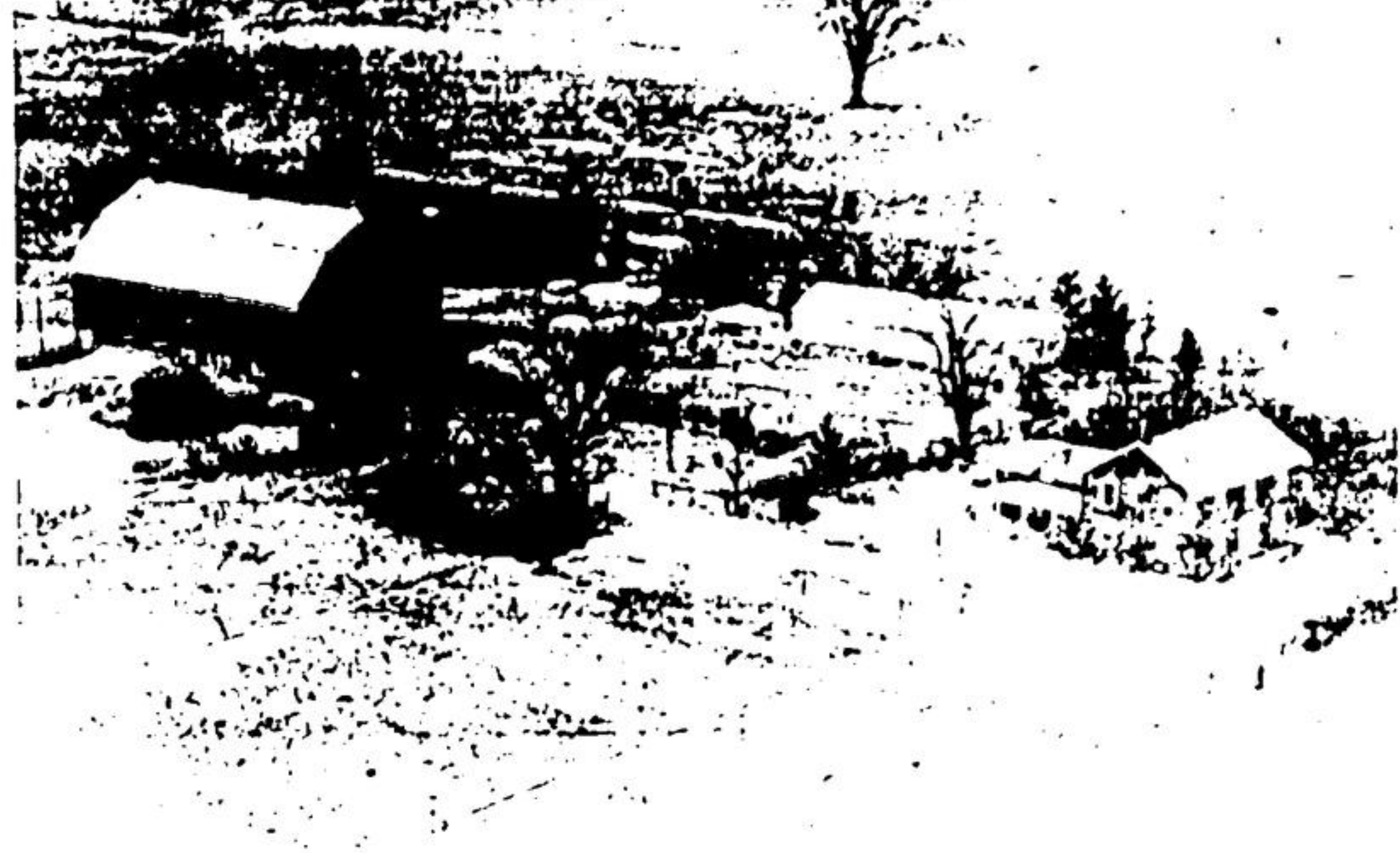

SILVER-WOOD

AROUND THE HOME
CORNER PLAYHOUSE...
A fence corner can be easily transformed into a child's playhouse — with 1" cross pieces — on which canvas may be tacked — and a piece of old material for the front, with two openings for windows.
SHADOW PICTURES... For attractive pictures with a 3-dimensional effect, cut out the desired illustration and paste on ¼" plywood. Then follow its outline with a small coping saw or jig-saw. Tack three small blocks (¼" thick) to back. Give two coats of varnish.
