## Cancer Research in Plants



Tumors in plants bear similarity to cancers in human beings. This has been borne out in research on Crown Gall, a bacterial organism infecting plants that brings about an abnormal growth that is comparable to cancer tissue in other forms of life. Crown Gall has been studied in the sunflower and in beet root. The study is now extended to trees, in the path of basswood.

George Barker, M.Sc., is working on this project under Dr. Duncan McLaren, Associate Professor of Botany, University of Western Ontario, to learn the characteristics and behaviour of growth patterns found in the tissue of the plant path. Mr. Barker graduated from

science in 1948 at Western. He is one of the young Canadians who used his DVA money at the end of the war to put himself through University. His studies have paid off, for on getting his Master's degree, he was one of the first non-medical students to be given a fellowship from the National Cancer Institute to study at Ann Arbor University, Michigan for two years. Mr. Barker is now what is called an Experimental Morphologist, one who delves in the science of organic form and structure closely related to physiology. On completion of his experiments at Western, he will join the staff of the Department of Botany in Guelph. A cultural center.
