BISHOP OF NIAGARA AT ST. GEORGE'S

A large class of men and women were confirmed at St. George's by the Bishop on Sunday. Mr. Ed Wilson carried the Bishop's wand. The sermon at the Confirmation service was preached by the Rt. Rev. Walter E. Bagnall, Bishop of Niagara. He gave the text: "My son, give me your heart" to the candidates who were confirmed. The Bishop compared our lives to a boat being carried down stream by the current. And that unless we gave our hearts to God, something else would take it and carry us to destruction. In his evening sermon the Archdeacon called to mind the origin of Confirmation and the Laying On of Hands. He also reminded those previously confirmed of the vows which they had taken. "O, Christ, the Heavens' Eternal King" was the anthem sung at the Confirmation service. In the evening "Christ the Lord is Risen Again" was sung by the choir. Both anthems were composed by Eric Thiman. The hymns "How Sweet the Name of Jesus Sounds", "All People That on Earth do Dwell" and "Lead Kindly Light" were some of the hymns sung on Sunday. The flowers on the altar were in memory of Mr. Lorne Dann.
