CHOIR CONCERT

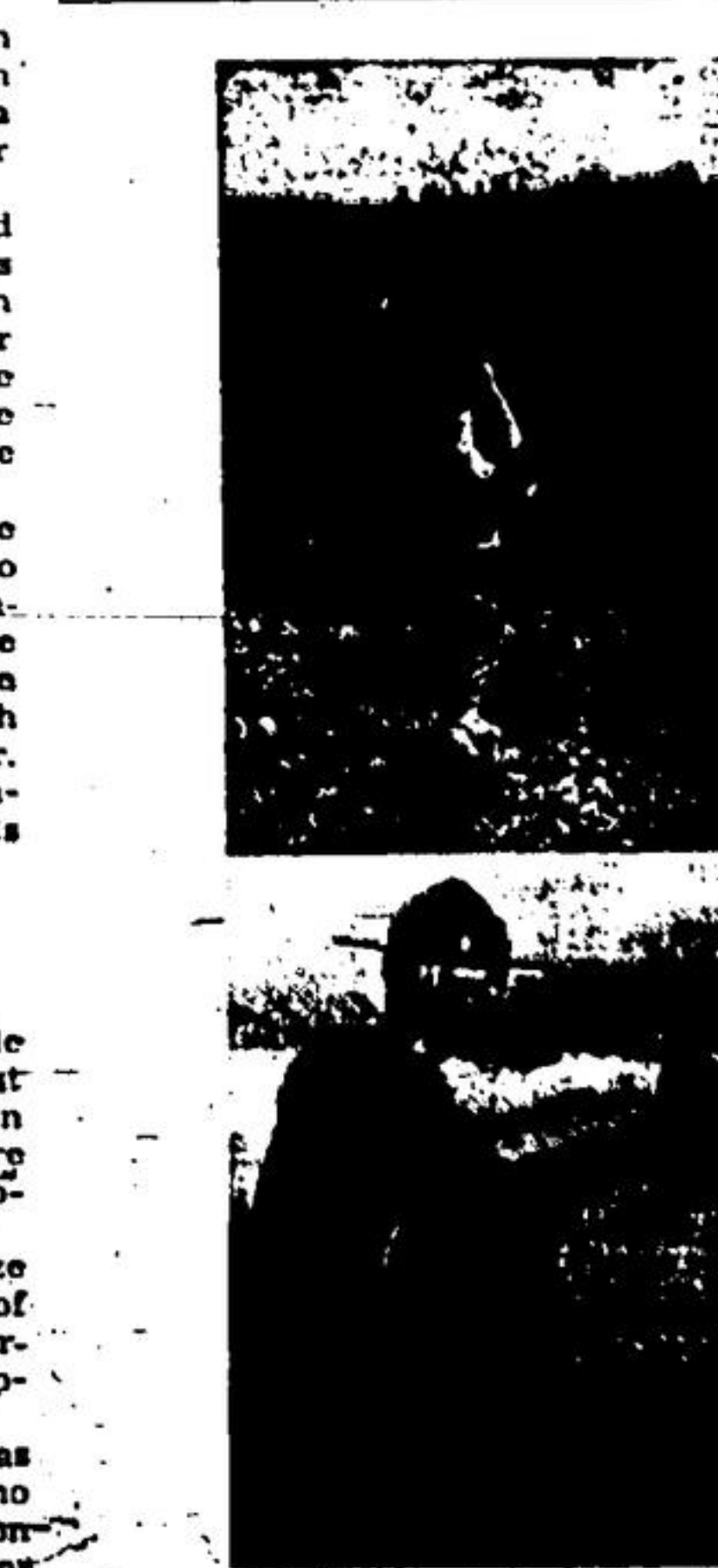
With Anthony Antonucci, flautist, as guest artist, the high school girls' choir presented a program in Knox Church last week. It was a real musical treat.
