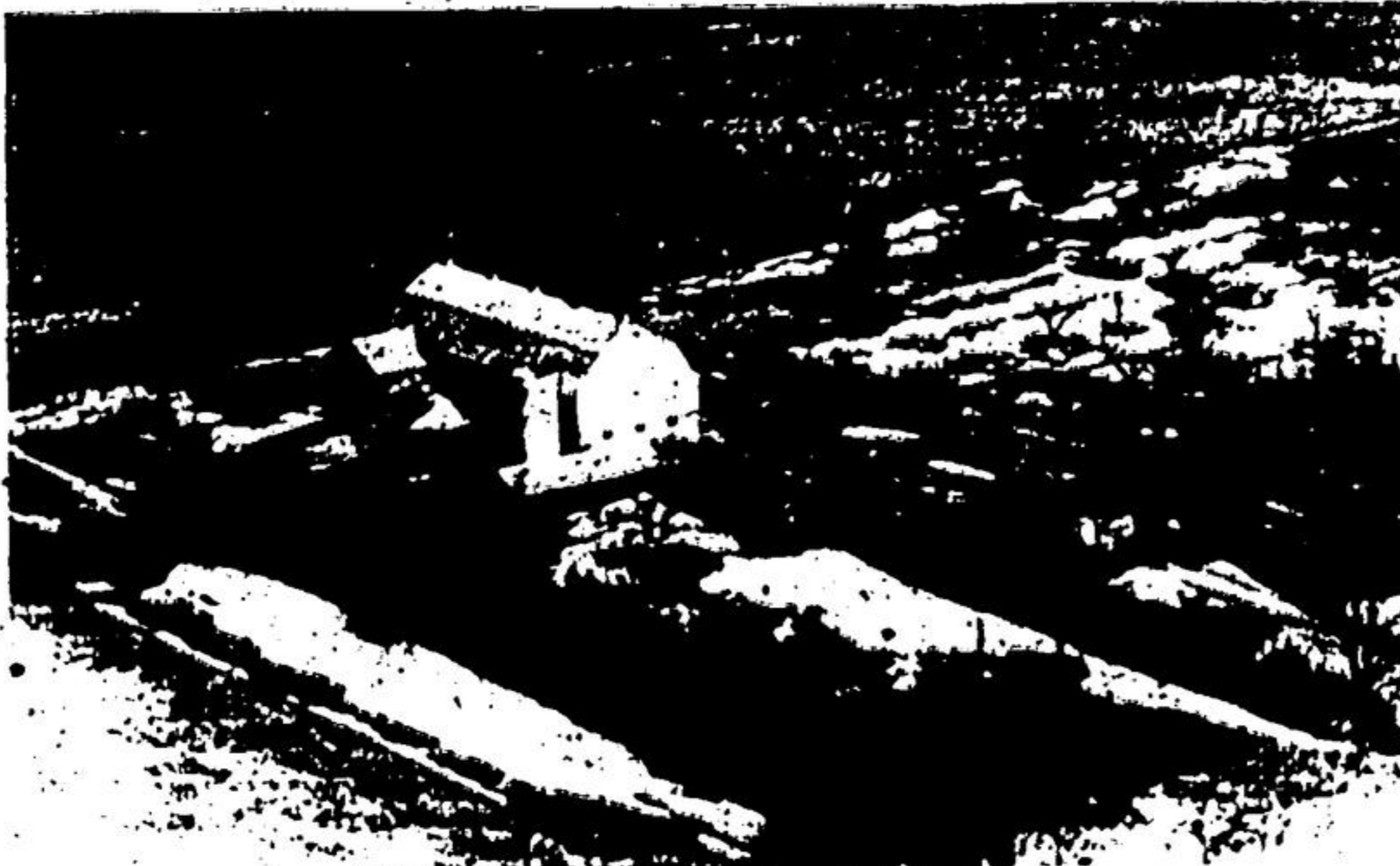


A "Scotch Block" Farm



The Herald's "lucky picture" on April 30th was the farm home of Mr. and Mrs. Hector Bird. It is situated on lot 14, on the 5th line Esquimaux and consists of 100 acres. It is one of a group of farms, which comprise the settlement known as the Scotch Block — This stretches from the base line on the south to the Check Line (No. 17) on the north, and from the Town line on the west to a boundary half way between the 5th and 6th concessions on the east. First settled by Scottish ancestors in 1820.

It is believed that the deed for this farm, was secured from the crown by Mr. James McPherson, on October 9th, 1844. In later years, Mrs. H. F. Lawson and then Mr. Matthew Williamson, both deceased, of Georgetown, owned the property, until 1918 when Mr. Thomas Bird and family moved to it from Chinguacousy, Peel County. Ten years later, the present owner bought it from his father and has resided on the farm since.

Hector has been interested in the

United Church, Georgetown, serving on the Board of Stewards, and the season. For the past six years he has been a member of the Township School Board, of which, at present he is chairman. His wife, formerly Mary McMeekin of Norval, is active in Mission Band and WMS work, and a past president of Ashgrove Women's Institute. They have two daughters, Jean and Margaret, who are students of Milton District High School, who also participate in Junior Homemaking Clubs.

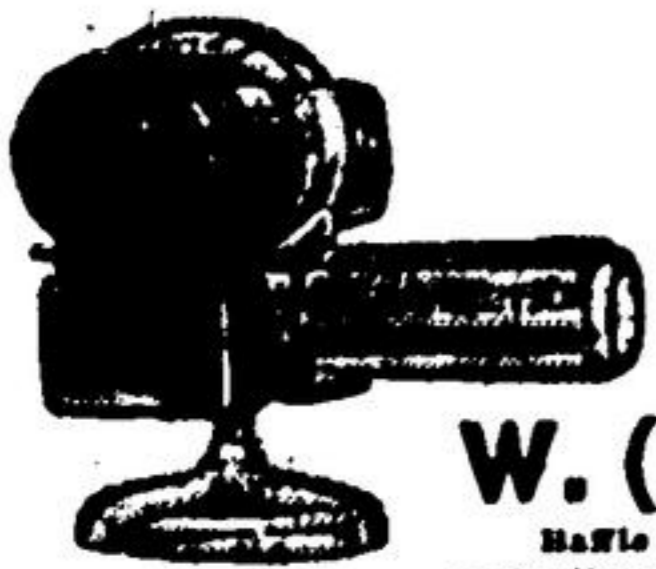
