What Council Did

ON MONDAY, MAY 19th

Met in special session to clear up items of business left over from regular monthly meeting.

Heard a request from the Sanitary Inspector of the County, Mr. Campbell, in regards to ridding the town dump of rats. He stated that the new method of controlling the rat menace had been tried out successfully in both Oakville and in Brampton. The use of Warfarin had proved to be the only poison which had been used effectively to date.

Council decided to check the dump to ascertain if there were sufficient rats around to warrant the cost of Warfarin. It will cost in the neighbourhood of \$100 to clean up the situation if council so decides at its next meeting.

Fred Hue addressed council in regards to a peddler's licence, as he intended to start a fish route. He was advised that if he was setting up a place of business in his home where the public could buy his product, he would be assessed business tax and had the privilege of peddling his product if so desired.

Budget figures were checked by council in order that the various departments might stay within their budget. These showed \$6004.12 already spent on roads, \$1376.50 for filling the streets being the biggest item to date. Hospital accounts were almost up to the budget figure — being \$606.15 to April 30. Work at the sewage disposal plant has already cost \$2,202.45, almost half the amount allowed in the budget.

Council reviewed the complete list of those in arrears of water rates and taxes, and instructed the treasurer to take immediate action to have these cleaned up at once. Delinquent water users face a cut-off if some satisfactory arrangement to pay up is not made within ten days time. There is \$377.00 in water rates arrears, and \$7677.00 in taxes in arrears, not taking into account the current taxes.

Appointed W. O. Brownridge to sell dog tags on a 25 per cent commission basis. He will make a house to house canvass, as all owners of dogs must have a licence.

Passed final motions in connection with the proposed new road-building program. It was pointed out by the road chairman that contrary to first opinion, it would be necessary to finance the road work under local improvement instead of on the general tax rate.

Filed a letter from the Hydro Commission estimating the cost at \$1700 to install a proper hydro service into the park. Council regretted the high cost of the project as the service was badly needed.
