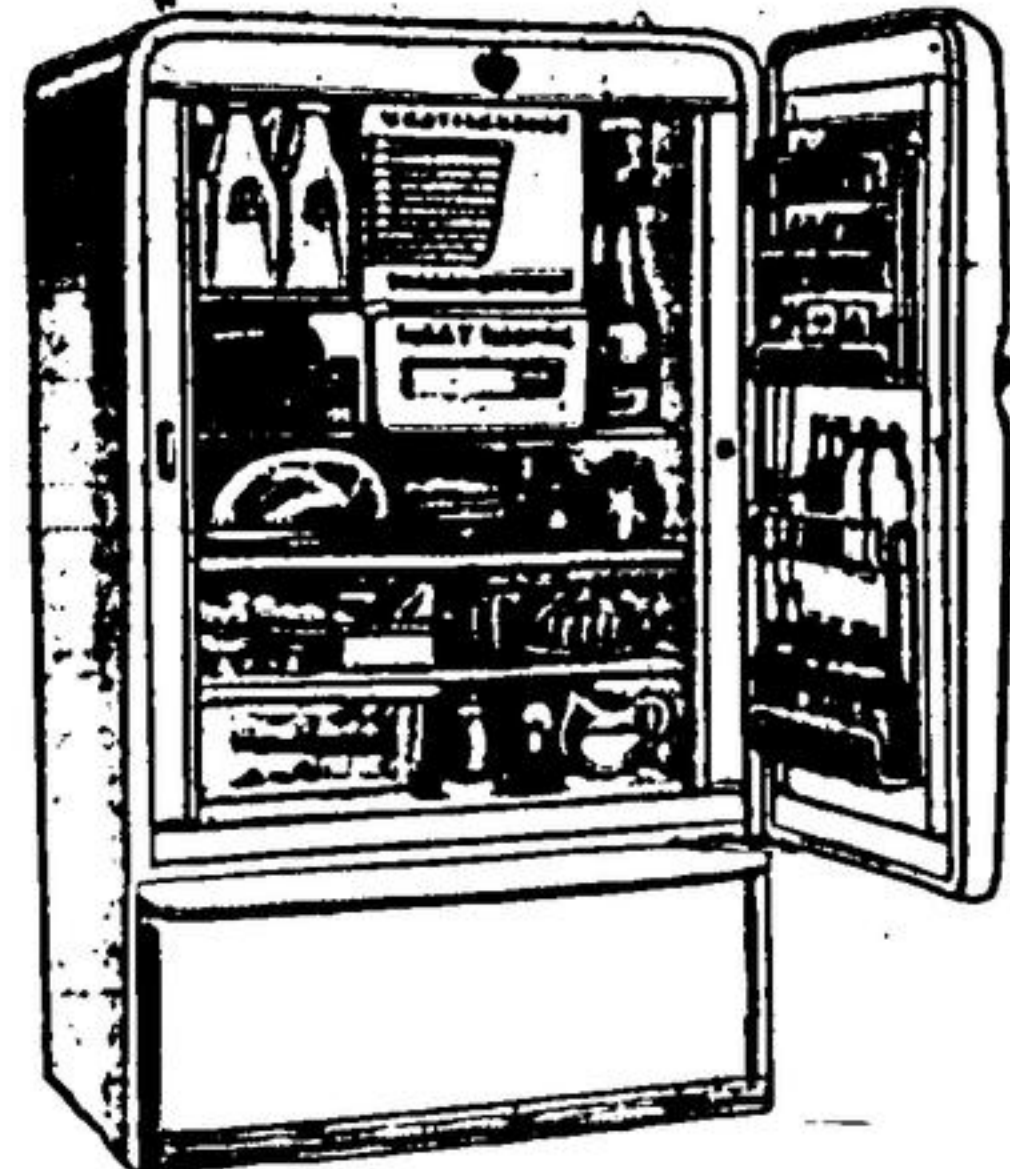

**Toronto Priest Here
For Holy Cross Mission**

A week's mission at Holy Cross Church concluded Sunday evening. The mission was in charge of Rev. Fr. Schruder, C.M. of the Vincentian Order, who is stationed at the mission house in Toronto. Masses were held during the week each morning at 5.45 and 7.45 and each evening there was instruction in Roman Catholic doctrine and a sermon. Evening devotions were closed with the benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. Short instruction was given at each mass as well.

The Blessed Sacrament was reposed in the Georgetown church during the week so daily visits could be made by the parishioners. The altars were beautifully decorated with flowers during the week and the choir and organist Mrs. William Carney provided special music for the services. Members of the congregation were enrolled in the confraternity of the Miraculous Medal and the confraternity of the Five Scapulars. The pastor Rev. Fr. Vincent Morgan assisted with the services, and

**Kiwanis Scholarships
Total \$125 This Year**

The Kingsway Kiwanis Club of Toronto has been taking a keen interest in the Junior agricultural extension programme in Halton for the past four years. Each year they have donated a scholarship of a week's short course at the Ontario Agricultural College to the winner in each of the club projects conducted in Halton. This year, Art Vivian, chairman of the Committee on Agricultural and Conservation for the Kingsway Kiwanis, advised agricultural representative J. E. Whitlock of their willingness to contribute a total of ten such scholarships, or a total of \$125.00. This in our opinion is a fine piece of work for a group with only 60 members, particularly when one realizes the many other community projects which they are also supporting. Two of these scholarships will be awarded in connection with Girls Garden Club work; three for Gair Club work; two for the top man in the Acton Tractor Maintenance Club; one to the winner in the Norval Junior Farmers Farm Machinery Club; and the final one to the runner up for the Championship Trip in the Halton Junior Farmers' Livestock Judging Competition.

**Rev. W. H. Moore is
Bible Society Speaker**

The annual open meeting of the Georgetown branch of the Upper Canada Bible Society, held in the Baptist Church on Wednesday night, was very well attended. Rev. A. J. Barker conducted the devotional period and Miss Jean Harley favoured with a solo. Douglas Cole acted as secretary for the meeting.

The chairman, J. D. Godfrey, then introduced Rev. W. Harry Moore, district secretary, who gave an interesting and informative address on the widespread work of the Bible Society in doing in Canada and nearly every country in the world. He then showed a sound film, "The World giveth Light" depicting very vividly the great work done by the Society in helping to rehabilitate those stricken with blindness, soldiers or civilians, by the publishing of the Bible in Braille of different types to suit the touch of different persons, and selling each volume at a very low cost, turning many from their feeling of despair and loneliness to that of a nearly normal, useful life.

All reports were very good. Officers were all reelected and a warm vote of thanks to Mr. Moore was passed. Also to the Baptist congregation for the use of their church. J. D. Godfrey is president and Watson Winfield, secretary-treasurer, and resident ministers are vice presidents of the Georgetown association.
