### Dr. E. G. Pleva Here Community Planning

Dr. E. G. Pleva, professor of Geography at the University of Western Ontario, gave an enlightening talk on Community Planning in Georgetown on Friday

Dr. Pleve was speeker at a turkey dinner held by St. John's Men's Club, at which members and guests totalling ninety were served dinner by the church W.A.

"If you like things us they are. you are living in the wrong place" he told his listeners, pointing out that in a decade southern Ontario has increased 23 per cent in population and 47 per cent in industry. This is only the beginning of a tremendous growth in this part of Ontario, he said.

Warning of the danger of becoming a dormitory community, he showed that unless a town has industry to pay a large share of taxes, these soon become excessive. Residential property does not pay its own way under our tax set-up. He cited Kitchener as the best balanced community in the district, with 50 per cent residential area. 25 per cent industrial and 25 per cent commercial.

To get industry a town should put its best foot forward, but should be careful to point out all the facts, he advised. Services such as water supply, sewerage and streets are Important. Schools, churches, cultural and recreational facilities all play their part when an industrialist is looking for a location. Don't offer something for nothing, he warned, for that only makes a prospect suspicious. Industry knows that in one way or another they will

have to pay takes. Only specific reference he made to Georgetown in his speech was a hint that the town should do something about beautifying the river flats on the highway which do not give strangers a good im-

pression of the town. Rev. John M. Smith introduced Dr. Pleva. Chairman for the evening was Ern Hyde, who was introduced by club president, Alex Maclaren. Reg Broomhead led a singsong, with Jim Burns at the piano.
