Chatting . . . With M.H.B.

WE COULDN'T imagine anything lovelier than our spring well, THIS Spring, anyway—but they tell us the season is even more beautiful in the British Isles. Mrs. Sam Penrice and children Jean, John and Douglas will be able to enjoy it there, having applied for her "home" in Ramsey, the Isle of Man, last week. Mr. Penrice, who is mill superintendent for Besumont Knitting Mills, Glen Williams, will join his family abroad in July and they will all return together in August.

While chatting with Mrs. Penrice before her departure, we asked a few questions about the Isle of Man, which is located—in case your geography needs refreshing a little—just off the west coast of England, in the middle of the Irish Sea.

The island is thirty-two miles long by 12 across, and is exceedingly beautiful. There are many mountains and hills, and of course the sea is very near every part of the island. It is a great mecca for summer tourists and during the season its normal population of about 50,000 doubles. Mrs. Penrice was born on the Isle of Man. Mr. Penrice spent his childhood and young manhood there, and their 2 children, Jean and John were born there.

PEOPLE WHO live on the Isle of Man are known as Manx. There's a Manx association in Toronto, a branch of the international organization—of which Mr. and Mrs. Penrice are members. This summer, by happy coincidence, the Manx Associations all over North America are sponsoring a "Homecomers Week" back to the Isle, for which a special liner has been chartered this month. Great preparations are under way for their welcome back to the Isle of Man, and the Penrices hope to

meet many of their fellow-Association members.

WHEN MRS. Penrice told us of the people from the Isle of Man being called "Manx", she said that we'd probably often heard of the Manx cats. Well, it so happened we hadn't and so she told us that a Manx cat is a breed native to the island only, and its most distinguishing characteristic is that it has no tail. The true Manx cat has no trace of a tail whatever, being perfectly smooth at the back. They are also a little bigger than an ordinary cat, and longer in the legs. We wondered how these cats had happened to be on the Isle of Man and Mrs. Penrice told us there is an old legend on the Isle which tells of the cats coming from ships of the Spanish Armada which were wrecked on the rocky island coast. Mrs. Penrice hopes to bring a Manx cat home with her, although she tells us they are quite hard to rear.

Mrs. Penrice and children sailed from Quebec aboard the "Francis" and will stay with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Brisson. The Penrice family, who live on McNab Street, have been in Canada for 4½ years and in Georgetown just over two years.
