'What's Next?' NHHSB Townships Won't Agree

Expressing keen disappointment at the action of the two township councils in turning down a . high school building program, North Halton high school board could think of no action which could be taken to speed the building of new high schools at their meeting Monday night at Georgetown.

Letters from Esquesing and Nassagaweya were read at the meeting in which they vetoed any building program until assessment differences between municipalities are aggreeably settled. At the present basis of sharing costs is in effect for four more years, the board feels that the delay will create a chaotic condition in the three high schools

A few of the members thought the board should resign in a body and let the five councils involved deal with the matter. Several said they were considering serving their term this year and then quitting. while others felt it was their duty as board members to continue and do whatever possible to keep up the standard of education in North

To put salary schedules in line with other communities, the minimum was raised to \$2700 and \$2800 for specialists. Resignations were received from Miss Gammie of the Acton staff and Mr. Roos. of Milton. The latter has accepted a position as head of a new school for mentally retarded children in Mantoba. Two members will attend the convention of Urban and Rural School Trustees at Bigwin Inn in

In order to get cheaper insurance rutes on the Milton school, the insurance company suggested that a fire door be placed into the manual training room| This, plus an extra fire hydrant near the school would considerably lower the rate being

Tenders will be called for next year's bus routes, for coal for Milton and Georgetown schools, and for painting the outside of Milton school. Consideration will also be given to creating a principal's office in Georgetown.

Because of confusion in using buses for school activities, the board established a fund of \$1 per pupil for transportation to extra-curricular activities, with the principals allowed to decide how the funds should be spent.

Principal J. L. Lambert explained that it would be necessary to eliminate some options at Georgetown school next year, in lieu of hiring an extra teacher. The new time table will mean a reduction from 15 to 10 papers offered in Upper School, elimination of an option in Grade D and one in Grade 10, and a reduction in Physical Training periods.
