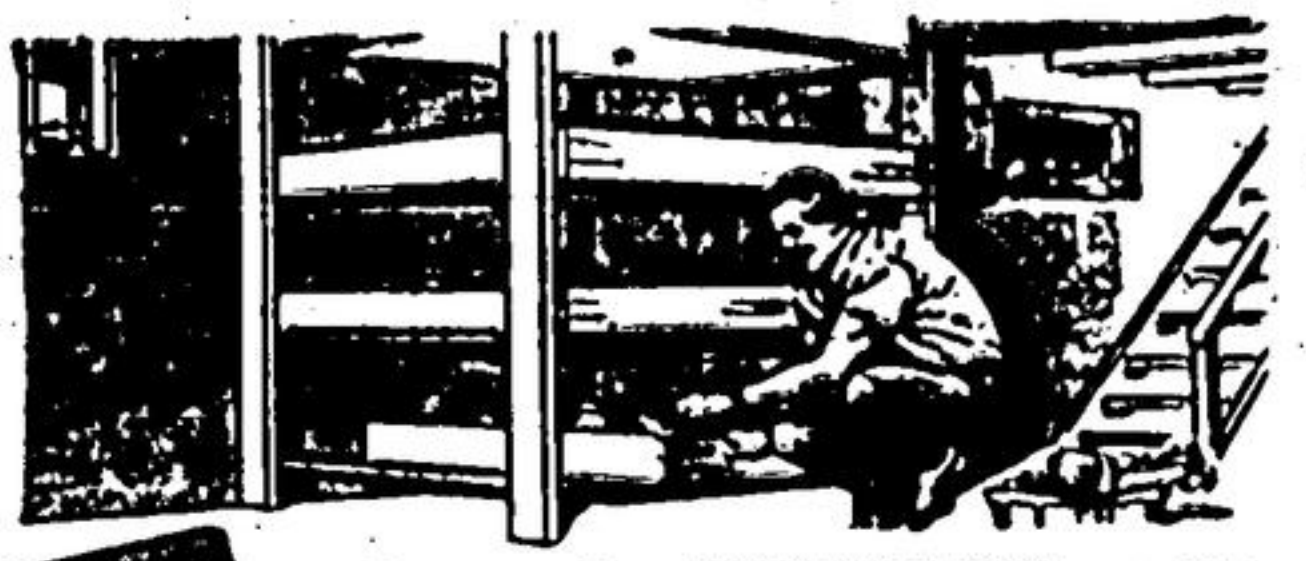


AROUND the HOME

For an airy **STORAGE BIN**, with sliding shelves, for fruits and vegetables—build 3" out from the wall. Uprights are 2 x 4 and runners 1 x 2. The sliding trays are 3" x 30" x 60". Slot bottoms are best, one inch apart for air.

FARM NEWS

Ontario Officials Visit Western Quarantine Area

Col. the Hon. T. L. Kennedy, Ontario Minister of Agriculture, accompanied by W. P. Watson, Ontario Livestock Commissioner, recently returned from a visit to the area near Regina at present quarantined for Foot and Mouth disease. Mr. Watson in conversation with the writer stated, "they have done a great job in cleaning up the area in question. It is perhaps open to question whether or not someone blundered at the outset but we would judge from Mr. Watson's statement that the Federal officials in charge have done and are doing a real job at the present time. From another source we would judge that relatively speaking, not too many good cattle have had to be slaughtered—while there has been the odd herd of pure bred dairy cattle, the quality of these would not compare with the average good commercial herd of pure bred in Ontario. Last night when attending a meeting at Brookville, one of the Nassagaweya Township officials reported that a certain resident of Halton in criticizing the Federal Government on the handling of the Foot and Mouth outbreak, stated, "And the 'constipation' they're paying isn't any good either". However, he that as it may be, our information is that the Compensation—being paid us every nickel the cattle are worth. Providing there isn't a further outbreak of the disease in Canada, various officials contacted seem optimistic that there are good chances that the embargo will be lifted by January, 1953.
