Japan's Wheat Crop
From a position of relative unimportance, wheat in recent years has become one of the major crops in Japan. During 1941-42, production averaged 49,535,800 bushels per year from 1,982,000 acres, with an average yield per acre of 2.3 bushels. Both acreage and yields per unit area have been greatly improved within historical times. Based on five-year averages for the periods 1878-82 and 1938-42, the areas in wheat have increased about 119 per cent, yields about 140 per cent and total production about 425 per cent.

Hill-Climbing Errors
One of the most common faults in hill climbing is to stay in high gear too long. Cars frequently labor up hills, going slower and slower until both car and engine have almost stopped. This is bad practice and sometimes dangerous. It is a common cause of overheating and "vaporlock." There is no point in straining to see how steep a hill can be climbed in high gear. When the car begins to labor on the hill, shift to second when the speed drops to around 20 miles an hour.

Biggest Ore Boat
Biggest and fastest Great Lakes ore carrier will be launched before 1950 by the Inland Steel company of Chicago. The new ship, designed by American Ship Building company, will be 668 feet long—over two-thirds the length of the Queen Elizabeth—and will carry an estimated 20,000 gross tons of cargo. Powered by a geared turbine delivering 7,000 horsepower, the vessel will make 13 1/4 knots when fully loaded.

Uninhabited Kerguelen Island
Kerguelen (frequently called "the island of desolation") lies midway between Australia and South Africa in the southern Indian ocean. It is situated in what is known as the circum-polar belt of low pressure, and continual succession of terrific gales sweeps over it. Only four species of plants are to be found on Kerguelen—a wild tea plant, a moss-like growth, a wild cabbage and lichens.

Wheelchair Town
A community of houses built around a wheelchair, is springing up in Needham, Mass., a suburb of Boston. The houses are designed so paraplegic veterans can maneuver about unhampered by the usual architectural restrictions. Doors are a foot and a half wider to permit free passage of wheelchairs and there are no thresholds.

Migration From Farms
Nearly a million persons moved to farms last year from cities, towns and villages, but more than one and one-half million moved away from farms. A century and a half ago nine-tenths of the American labor force worked on farms. Today, only one-sixth of the labor force is on farms.

Old Man River's Toll
Water tables are said to be falling, and more rivers are getting out of control. In one month—July, 1947—it was estimated that the Missouri floods carried off more than 115 million tons of the topsoil that has made Iowa one of the richest agricultural regions in the world.

New Source of Tannin
Chestnut, great domestic source of tannin, has virtually been wiped out by blight. Most important vegetable tanning agent now comes from the quebracho tree, grown almost entirely in the forests of northern Argentina and southern Paraguay.

Laminated Wood Arch
Laminated wood arch is not new, having been developed in Europe about 1900. The glued laminations act together much more efficiently than if nailed or bolted and make spans as great as 100 feet practical.

Effects of Brucellosis
Brucellosis in human beings causes a lingering fever. In cattle it results in reproduction failures. Brucellosis is a definite problem in rural populations and among those people who drink raw milk.

Driving Nails
Nails driven into pre-bored holes of slightly smaller diameter have a greater holding power than if driven without lead holes and splitting is reduced by the same operation.

Farm Ponds
If the water level is kept constant in a farm pond, it will provide about 250 pounds of fish a year for each acre of water surface.

Minerals for Corn
It takes about 150 pounds of nitrogen, 25 pounds of phosphorus and 75 pounds of potassium to produce 100 bushels of corn.

Alaska—Oil Output
Alaska is famous for its wealth of minerals, metals, fish, fur and lumber. It also may contain noteworthy reserves of petroleum.
