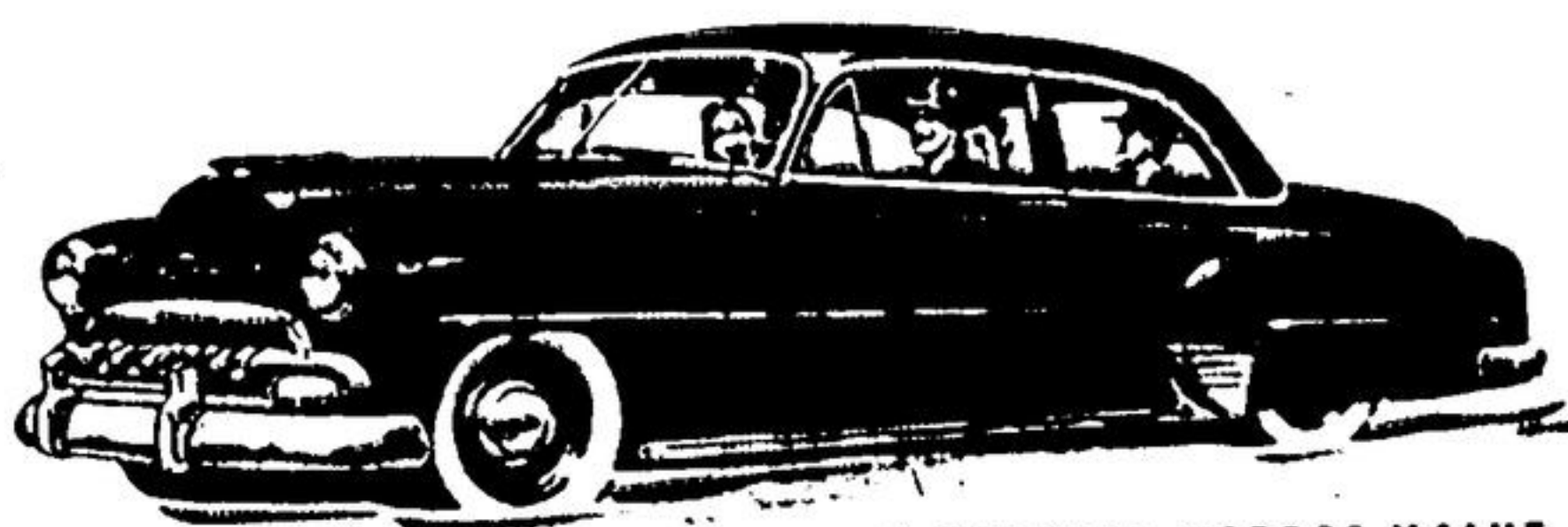

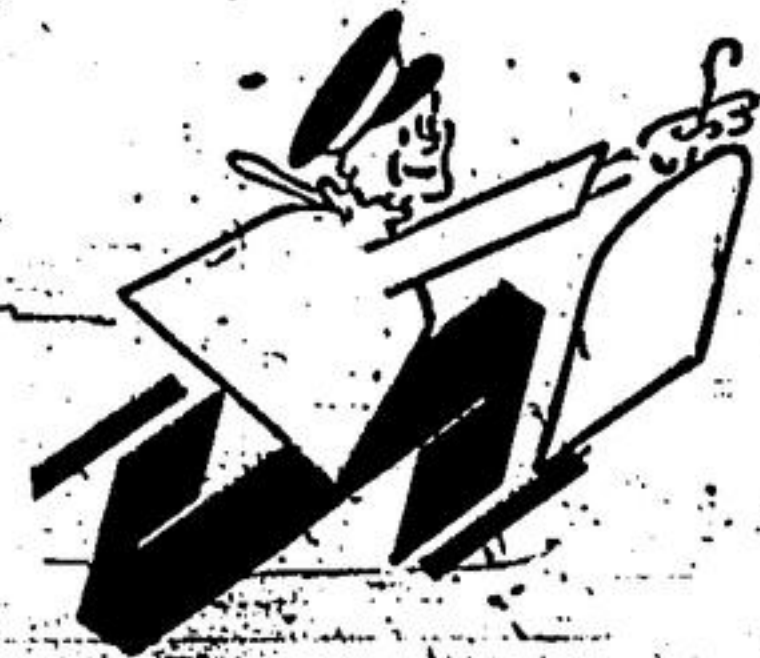
FARM GROUP HEAR ART OF SPEAKING
