SORRY, WE CAN'T LET YOU KNOW
Numerous advertisements appear each week in the Georgetown Herald, as in most other papers, which end "Apply to Box No. . . . The Georgetown Herald."
And each week the paper receives numerous enquiries along the lines of "Will you please tell me who

the advertiser for Box No. . . . is?" In each and every case our answer has to be in the negative. Perhaps a word of explanation as to why might be in order. There are several reasons. One is that the advertiser may find it more convenient to keep his or her identity unknown. He or she may want to secure offers and have a chance to study them. In other cases it may

be because the inserter lives out-of-town and takes advantage of the convenient method of having replies forwarded to his address by this paper. Another is that the advertiser may not want to be importuned by people having something to sell, etc.
In any event the fact remains that the advertiser is paying a small service charge for the use of a box number. It is understood that when a box number is used the paper is bound to regard the advertiser's identity as confidential. Therefore, by revealing it, the paper would be breaking faith with its advertiser and by revealing his or her name robbing them of an extra service for which they pay.
We hope that our readers will appreciate the fact that the Herald is not unwilling to cooperate with them when they seek information as to the identity of a box number holder, but that it is legally and morally bound not to give this out.
