Belle leads with a new North American Record on three times milking in 305 days. as a senior four year old, with 15,748 lbs of milk and 907 lbs. of fat with an average test of 5.75%. She qualifies for a medal of Merit, Gold and Silver Medal Certificate, as well as a Ton of Gold Certificute in her first three records. Needless to say, she classifies "Excellent" and is one of the greatest cows that the breed has ever pro-

duced. . Laverne Carroll, of Wilton Grove in Middlesex County, has the high cow in the 305 day division on two times milking. His cow, Glen. Poldy's Pet, classified 'Excellent' finished a record at aix years of 11,335 lbs. of milk and 674 lbs. of fat with a test of 5.95%. .
