— with 1" cross pieces
on which canvas may
be tacked — and
a piece of old material
for the front, with two
openings for windows.

pictures with a 3-dimensional effect, cut out the desired
illustration and paste on 1/4" plywood. Then follow its
outline with a small coping saw
or jig-saw. Tack three small
blocks (1/4" thick) to back.
Give two-coats of varnish.

President J. F. Trimble of the Halton Club was in charge of the excellent programme. George Drennan, popular Holstein fieldman, was the official adjudicator of the competition in Selective Registration. While it would be too much to expect every one to agree with the official grading, nevertheless all were agreed that the genial George handled the difficult job in a masterly style. Incidentally, the announcement of the winners by Art Bennett, newly appointed assistant rep. for Halton and Peel counties, created no little amusement and perhaps some embarrassment to the breeders of the "Blacks and Whites" in both ladies' and men's sections the top awards were won by Jersey breeders — Mrs. M. C. Bentz, Millon, winning in the ladies' section, and Mac Alexander of Norval, in the men's section.

Ross Sogsworth, Halton director on the National Holstein-Friesian Board, ably expressed the appreciation of those present to Mr. Carroll, Hays Ltd., George Drennan and last but

not least to the ladies who provided the delicious refreshments.

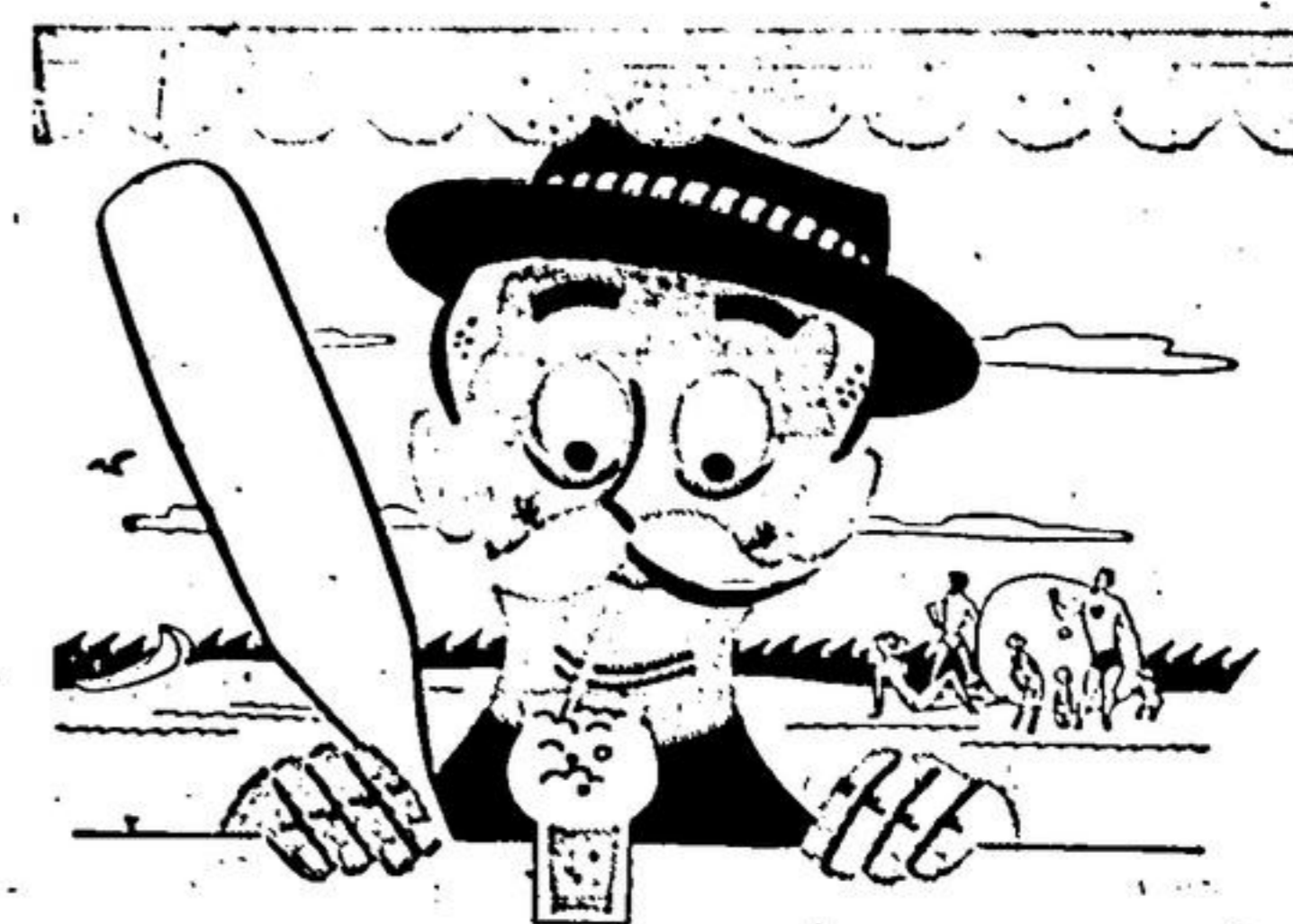

**HAY WILL FEATURE
MILTON FALL FAIR**

We understand from Mrs. George Readhead, secretary of the Halton Agricultural Society, that at a recent meeting of the Board of Directors, it was decided that the 1952 show at Milton will feature "Hay" as their commercial feature. This would appear to be a step in the right direction. It is generally admitted that hay and pasture are our two most important and valuable crops in the mixed farming sections of the county. In short, the quality of the hays and pasture frequently means the difference between profit and loss to both the dairyman and beef producer.

The suggested prize list includes the following classes:
(a) bale of first cutting of hay (minimum weight 40 lbs.); (b) bale of second cutting of hay (minimum weight 40 lbs.); (c) bushel of chopped hay (field chopped); (d) bushel of grass or clover silage.
We understand there is also to be inter-group competition open to Junior Farmers, Farm Forum or other farm organizations. Excellent prizes are being offered which should be some inducement to make this new feature not only a credit to Halton Farmers, but of real educational value.
