# Chatting . . . With M.H.B.

WE WERE talking with Mrs. W. G. O. Thompson after their recent 10-day vacation in Ottawa, and she told us of a few incidents which we think you will find interesting . . .

For instance, on the 9th of June, Archdeacon W. G. O. Thompson celebrated the 40th anniversary of his priesthood. They were in Ottawa of course, and the Archdeacon was invited to be Celebrant at St. Bartholomew's Church of England on that occasion. Incidentally, St. Bartholomew's is the church attended by the Governor-General and his staff, and is situated facing his residence. It is a quaint, beautifully appointed little church, very old, and quite unique in many respects. One way in which it differs from other Anglican churches, is in having the organ and choir at the back of the church rather than in the chancel.

Archdeacon Thompson was particularly pleased to take the service at St. Bartholomew's because his room-mate while attending Trinity College, the Rev. John Dickson, was a former rector of the little church. Mr. Dickson is now the Bishop of Montreal.
