Toronto Mission Work Told at St. John's
Sunday morning service at St. John's United Church was given over to an appreciation of the work of the Fred Victor Mission in downtown Toronto, a helping mission of the United Church, and one which has appealed for some time to the Sunday School, especially, but to the whole congregation also, of the church in Georgetown, particularly as a means of doing a personal, tangible work in helping to meet the needs of many unfortunate ones. Dr. Wesley Hunnisett was the guest speaker and as he is director of this mission, and has given all of his 35 years in the Christian Ministry to it, he has a rich store of experience from which to draw, and it was no trouble for him to keep the Sunday School at quiet attention while he told them of many of his experiences. He also contrasted them on their well organized missionary efforts.
In the church service, the Rev. John M. Smith conducted the worship and read as his scripture lesson the appropriate story of the good Samaritan. He introduced Dr. Hunnisett to the congregation, paying tribute to the great work he had done and was still doing a work for which his kindly Christian personality eminently fits him. Dr. Hunnisett took as his text Luke 4:16 the record that Jesus, as his custom was, he went into the synagogue on the Sabbath Day, and stood up for to read, showing that Jesus fully identified himself with the church and its customs, and

was willing to take His share in its activities, along with His going about doing good, healing the sick, comforting and helping the poor and down-trodden.
Dr. Hunnisett outlined the work of the mission, and from the fact that every night of the year, between 30 and 70, men and women, really down and out sleep in the Mission, many on the Chapel floor, it is easily understood the many heartbreaking and baffling problems of human nature the mission faces and cases. It was quite evident, from the incidents related, that the abuse of strong drink was the greatest cause of the woe and suffering that drove the people to the mission, and was the greatest enemy of its work. He told also of the satisfaction which often came to him and his helpers, as they saw many who had been definite human wrecks gradually rise to a more normal life and later realize and acknowledge that God was able to do wonderful things with their lives. In closing with Dominion Day approaching, Dr. Hunnisett quoted Isaiah 60 vs 12: "For the nation and kingdom that will not serve Thee shall perish; and stressed that the nation which builds up the good and does all it can to restrain the harmful and evil God will prosper, otherwise it will surely perish as many fallen empires can testify.
Rev. Dr. W. Hunnisett has the honor of being Moderator of the Toronto Conference of the United Church this year.
He paid tribute to the help in the mission that Mr. Laird had given along musical lines. Mrs. Kibbey gave a prayer, "Prepare Ye the Way of the Lord."
Let us remember, "A simple, yet beautiful philosophy of life. Do all the good you can, get all the fun you can while you are doing it. Just watch that your fun does not undo you for your duty."

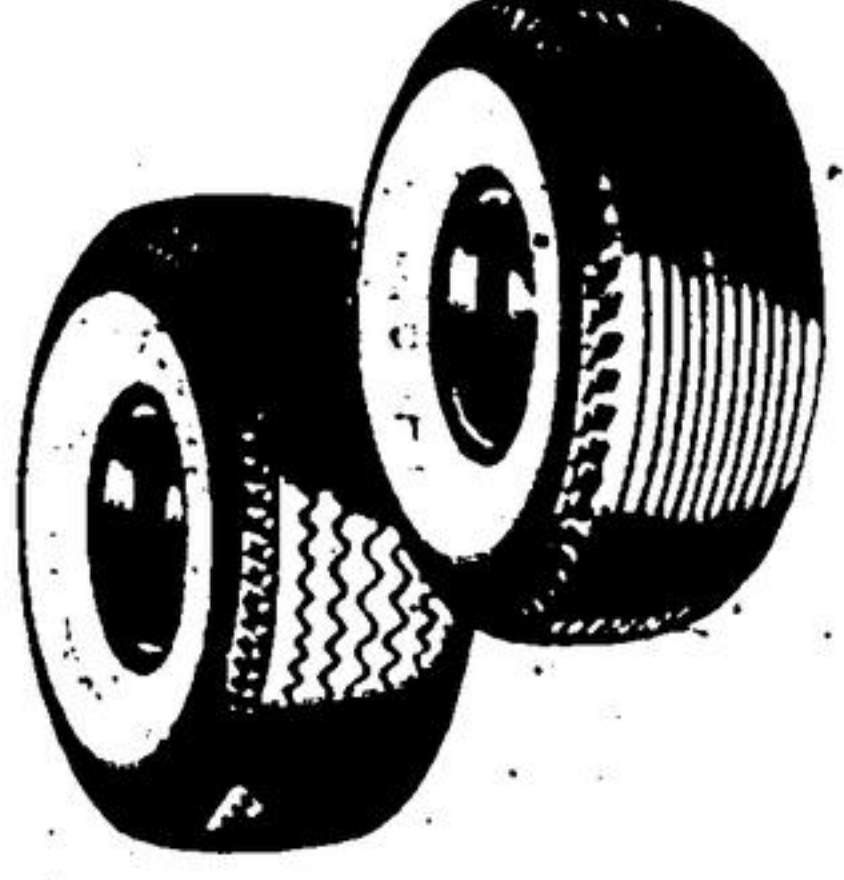
