

FARM NEWS
INTEREST KEEN
IN FARM PONDS
Since the Farm Pond policy was approved by the Halton County Council on March 11th last, some 43 Halton landowners have submitted applications to J. E. Whitlock, secretary of the Halton Conservation Committee. The proposed sites have all been surveyed or inspected by a representative of the Department of Agricultural Engineering at the Ontario Agricultural College. Due to soil conditions which makes the water holding ability of the proposed ponds rather problematical, thirteen of the proposed sites were not approved.
In other words thirty sites have been approved, but it would not appear that more than twenty of these will be subsidized under the Halton policy in 1953. It will be recalled that under the policy suggested by the Halton Conservation Committee and approved by the Halton County Council only \$2000 is available for ponds constructed in the period March 11th, 1952 to Dec. 31st, 1952. Fifty per cent of this amount is provided by the Halton County Council, an equal amount by the Ontario Department of Agriculture. The policy in question provides a subsidy of fifty per cent of the cost up to a maximum of \$100 on any approved pond. If the first twenty applicants construct approved ponds each costing \$200 or more to construct, that will take the entire \$2000 available under the policy. At a recent meeting of the Halton Conservation Committee it was agreed however, that in the event the policy is continued in 1953, then those who do not qualify in the first twenty, will automatically go on the priority list for 1953. While Halton is the only county in the province to adopt a farm pond policy, several river valley authorities have launched similar subsidized projects.

FARM NEWS
BEEF CATTLE PRICES
CONTINUE STRONG
Active trading supported by a good demand has resulted in higher prices for beef cattle on Canadian markets. During the past two weeks choice steers have brought as high as \$29.00 per cwt. This price when the exchange value of the Canadian dollar, etc. is taken into consideration means that our Canadian cattle are bringing very close to prices across the U.S. border. It makes one wonder if some of our feeders are wise in holding cattle which are already finished. In other words are cattle prices likely to strengthen much above present prices, if and when the embargo is removed? If our livestock officials are correct there are a lot of cattle which will have to be marketed between now and the end of the year. If the present embargo remains against Canadian cattle, it would seem logical to us to anticipate lower rather than much higher prices between now and 1953.
Open Air Service Held
For County Anglicans

An open air service was held in the afternoon at which Canon Stanley Kirk of Guelph was preacher. Several clergymen assisted in the service, including Archdeacon W. G. O. Thompson, Georgetown, Rural Dean Heathcote, Burlington, Rev. Homer Ferris, Milton, Rev. John Munro, Oakville and Rev. Ralph Porritt, Lowville.
Frank Thompson, Milton, who is president of the county Laymen's Association which sponsored the service, spoke briefly at the start of the service.
