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What Council Did

ON MONDAY, JULY 7th

Heard a deputation from Normandy Boulevard in regard to surveys of their property. They suggested that a reasonable surveyor's fee might be derived if their lots could be surveyed when the town is surveying for the new sidewalks. Council promised to contact the engineer in this regard.

Gave Smith & Stone Ltd. permission to install a fire alarm system between their plant on King St. and the area at the town hall and the station.

Fire Chief Hyde said the firemen were willing to finance the purchase of a 1-ton panel truck for use by the brigade if council would maintain it. It was felt that a small truck was necessary to carry extra equipment. Council agreed to this.

Passed a resolution setting the standby time for the proposed Esquising fire area at \$1.00 on every \$2500 assessment, and instructed the clerk to forward same to the township.

Granted the Fire Brigade the usual \$100 to meet expenses at the convention to be held this year at Stamford Centre.

Set Monday, August 4, as a Civic Holiday for Georgetown.

Being asked by the rent controller as to whether they wished rent controls to come off in Georgetown in the near future, council felt that while this was a provincial matter, they did not favour the relaxation of controls at the present time.

By-laws were given first and second readings in regards to the paving, sewer and sidewalk program being undertaken by council. They will now be forwarded to the Municipal Board, whose consent council must have before issuing the necessary debentures.

A number of hazardous trees will be taken down. The Cedarvale Tree Experts being hired to do the job.

\$90 Divides Esquising-Georgetown Mutual Fire District Set-up

A special meeting of Georgetown Council was called last Thursday evening to meet with Esquising Council to discuss the proposed Esquising-Georgetown Fire Area further. Due to the municipal building being painted the meeting was held at Stewarttown Hall.

After considerable discussion the sum of \$90 seemed all that was left between the two councils and the new fire set-up.

Esquising were paying the Milton Brigade \$800 standby time, plus \$50 per fire, and the same comparative figure was sought on an assessment basis. This would give Georgetown \$400 as Milton district had a building assessment of \$2,818,925 while the new area would only have an assessment of \$1,361,904.

Georgetown Council argued that the number of villages in the area produced a greater fire hazard than probably the more highly assessed property around Milton, but Esquising council thought there was no other way to set the rate for stand-
