"The Kingdom of God" Text for Sunday Sermon

At St. John's United Church on Sunday morning the Rev. John M Smith chose as his subject - "The Kingdom of God." Jesus' vision of the God' Kingdom, all it represented of God's love and purpose for the world of men, and all it meant for man himself. Nearly all big movements are started from a strong clear vision of someone, seeing what can be attained, often for good, but sometimes for ill. Twice in a generation, we have seen the sad results of two visions of power, almost ruining our world and yet another is threetening us. Even the vision or dream of Augustine, good though it was with its intent of spreading the gospel along with the spreading of the Roman Empire, is marred somewhat as we look back, by the feeling that the Roman Empire and its king came first, the spreading of the Christian, gospel and the Kingdom of God on earth, the exaltation of its King, was a secondary matter. If we would help Jesus fulfil his vision of the Kingdom of God and exalt its king, we must give full allegiance to Him, and be prepared to make the necessary sacrifices so that His Kingdom will grow, and not be held back. What was Jesus' vision of the Kingdom of God? An everlasting Kingdom, starting like a inustard seed, among the smallest of seeds, and growing as a tree, whose branches shelter the birds. giving security and comfort; a kingdom which can only be entered in the spirit of a little child: where there is love, peace and goodwill. No night, no tears, where God reigns in love and mercy. With our allegiance we must give loyally, for the Kingdom has many open enemies without, and subtle enemies within, to be fought and overcome.

We must accept its responsibilities, if we expect to enjoy its rights and privileges. Its privileges, what are they? Jesus said: ('Seek ye' first the Kingdom of God, and all these things (our needs) shall be added unto you. Jesus promised comfort for those who mourn; rest for the weary, love, real peace, forgiveness, victory even over death, and life everlasting, a place in a "kingdom that cannot be moved." Mr. Smith used Romans 12, to show the holiness expected of us, and the practical duties recommended if we would be servants of the Kingdom of God, and faithful to its King.

Fern Caird sang: "Bless Thou This Day". It was announced that next Sunday would be Communion

Sunday. Let us remember: The bible is the Book of the Kingdom. It replaces the fiction of man, with the facts of God, It-has one main road on which to get home to God, and into His Kingdom.

Eighth Brownridge Reunion Held Saturday at Brampton

On Saturday, July 5th, 200 members of the Brownridge family held their eighth family reunion at the Brampton Fair Grounds.

Great would be the surprise of Thomas Brownridge, who emigrated to Canada in 1819 from Yorkshire, England, if he knew that in 1952 he would have over 500 desecendants extending to the sixth generation born in North America. In 1822 he married Eliza Ward of Islington, und they homesteaded on Lot 4. Concession 7, of Esquesing Township, Walton, Ontario, where seven sons and one daughter were born to them. This homestead has been continuously in the Brownridge name for over 130 years and during this time has welcomed six newly wedded couples.' The present owners are Mr. and Mrs. Ward Brownridge, who are living in the original house built by Thomas Brownridge. On the farm, in the family cemetery, are buried Thomas and Elies Brownidge and Thomas' brother, William, who came with him from

Yorkshire, England. The first reunion held in 1908 and all since that time have taken place on the homestead but due to the increasing numbers larger accommodation was necessary this

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
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
