

## BUS ROUTES REMAIN THE SAME DISTRICT BOARD DECIDES

At a full meeting of North Halton High School Board in Stewarttown on Thursday night, tenders for bus routes were awarded as formerly to four drivers.

The special meeting had been called to deal with the matter because at a previous meeting four of the twelve members were absent, and it was thought the business was sufficiently important for all to have a say in the final decision.

Tenders had been received from the present drivers, George Inglis, M. Poole, E. Tyler and Art Scott for their present routes. In addition, Mr. Scott had tendered on all other routes except the Nassagaweya run. The three tenders were at 35c a mile, while the Scott tender was at 35c for the first 50 miles on each route and 25c thereafter.

Proponents of Mr. Scott claimed that the financial saving of approximately \$1400 should not be turned down. Those who favoured retaining the present drivers pointed to their record of service for five years and the fact that the men had heavy investments in equipment.

After a full discussion of the question, a vote was taken on a motion to leave contracts with the present four drivers, and with the chairman voting also, the motion passed by a vote of 8 to 4.

The question of redistributing students to allow more rural students at Georgetown was discussed in connection with the tender awards. Walter Blehn, a Georgetown member contended that there are very few rural students at present attending Georgetown school and that the Milton and Acton bus routes come much too close to town. Students from Stewarttown, Ashgrove and Limehouse who would normally be attending Georgetown, are being transported to the other schools, he contended.

from one school to another and to let those who had started their courses at Acton and Milton continue. This year, all these students will have graduated, and next year it is planned to change routes in order to send students to their nearest school wherever possible.

At present Mr. Tyler's route takes in students to Acton from parts of Nassagaweya and Esqueing, coming as far as the Stone School, with a total of 93 miles daily. Mr. Inglis drives 88 miles daily taking Nassagaweya students to Milton. Mr. Poole's 77 mile route goes from Campbellville as far as Norval and Stewarttown. Mr. Scott has a 44 mile route from Terra Cotta to Norval.
