

## QUIZ FARM DATES BACK TO 1821



June 18th pnoto quiz picture was readily recognized by some as the D. R. McLaughlin Farm on the Check Line, at the corner of the 5th concession. This is one of finest farms in this part of the country and was purchased by Mr. McLaughlin from Col. D. H. C. Mason who had acquired the propcrty in 1926.

The Patent from the Crown is dated the 20th of October, 1821 and the property was patented to Thomas McCormick, of the Town of Niagara: A few weeks later, on the 10th of December, 1821, Thomas Mc-Cormick conveyed the property to Robert Bessey, who is described in the conveyance as a yeoman living in the Township of Grantham, which is in Lincoln County. The consideration for this conveyance was \$100.

On the 11th of October, '1838. Robert Bessey conveyed the property to his son John Reade Bessey. Robert Bessey does not seem to have lived on the property because in this conveyance to his son he is described as being of the Township of Grantham. As the consideration mentioned in this conveyance was five shillings, it was no doubt a

It may be of interest to know that during John R. Bessey's' ownership of the property a sale was made of some of the timber on the property. The agreement for the sale of this timber is dated the 23rd of November, 1881 and the timber

On the 20th of April. 1893, Susan Rebecca Bessey conveyed the property to William Bowman, who is described as having been formerly resident in Little York, but being then resident in the Township of Esquesing in which the property is situated. William Bowman had the property for 20 years and on the 1st of April. 1913 conveyed it to William Bowman the younger. In 1916 it was conveyed by the lastmentioned owner to Thomas W Evans, In 1919 it was conveyed by Thomas W. Evans to Leslie Fisher Denison and Alice Geraldine Denion, his wife, and in 1921 by the Denisons to Robert Stone. Shortly after Mr. Denison conveyed to William J. Clark, barrister, of Toronto and he conveyed to Thomas W. Evans from whom Col. Mason purchused, thence to the present owner.
