Observe Lord's Supper At St. John's Church

On Sunday morning, in St. John's United Church, the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was observed, and although the weather was warm and the holiday season is with us, there was a large congregation. The Rev. John M. Smith read as his scripture lesson, the Bible's record of the institution of the Lord's Supper by Jesus Himself on the night on which He was betrayed, an ordinance which He asked us to keep in remembrance of Him and as a testimony to Him. Mr. Smith's message, leading to the observance of the communion, was based on this Scripture lesson and the words of Jesus "For as often as ye eat this bread and drink this cup, ye do shew the Lord's death till He come."

The communion table, with its white linen, the bread and wine, were symbols of the Kingdom of God. They declare unto us the Lord's death for us, and for all humanity, the great sacrifice of God's love for the redemption of the world and for the bringing of it back to God, to whom it rightfully belongs. But these symbols also remind us of a living Saviour, one who returned from death unto life, and who is here to give us life more abundantly. Then too it is a fellowship as a family around a table, giving thanks to God, and breaking bread together in love and peace and happiness. Not a fellowship of man and God alone, or man with man alone, but as a triangle of God's love and fellowship with man, then unity flowing back to God.

Further, the communion reminds us of the Forgiveness which is ours, a forgiveness which is very great and very necessary after our continual transgression of God's law, a forgiveness which Jesus assured us was complete because of His sacrifice as God's Only Beloved Son, and that God would accept that sacrifice as a full redemption, if we were sincere in believing. Then too, the communion calls for a renewal of our consecration to God and His Kingdom, and an increase in our efforts to further that Kingdom on earth. It also holds out to us again a rich promise for the future, the abundant life here and a rich inheritance of Life Everlasting, a great blessing for time and Eternity.
