**C.C.F. PICNIC AT STREETSVILLE PARK**  
Over a hundred persons attended the Co-Operative Commonwealth Federation picnic which was held in Streetsville Memorial Park on Saturday, July 5. The Peel County CCF association were hosts to many members of the Halton County Association. The program began with races for both young and old with appropriate prizes for the winners and continued with a baseball game between the members from both Peel and Halton. The Halton members, with a little assistance from several CCF'ers from the Toronto section came out on top with a score of 14-15.  
After enjoying a basket supper together, Bill White led the group in a successful attempt at singing folk songs in four parts. Charlie Jenkins of Brampton asked someone to introduce Halton's candidate to the gathering and Ronald Crews, complied. Stanley Allen, the candidate and past president of the Halton Association, urged the Peel members to choose their candidate in the near future and place the policies of the Co-Operative Commonwealth Federation before the people of Halton. "We in the CCF know," he said "that when election time comes along, these same policies will be embodied in the election platform of the party."  
Since David Lewis had been unable to attend the picnic because of illness in his family, Mr. Fred Young the provincial organizer spoke to the meeting. He reviewed the results of the elections in Saskatchewan, B.C. and Ontario, and said that the emergence of the Social Credit Party in British Columbia had prevented the C.C.F. from obtaining a clear-cut majority there. After pointing out the benefits obtained in Saskatchewan from the government health and

**\$640 TOP PRICE FOR HOLSTEIN**  
H. C. Cooper, Oakville, Ontario, bought the two top animals at the Hays' Twilight Holstein Sale held at Oakville, Ont. Top price was \$640 paid to James Henderson, of Bolton, Ontario for the six-year-old cow Patricia Rag Apple Keyes while the second highest price was \$580 received by Fred Stewart, St. Catharines, Ont., also for a six year old cow.  
The 34 head sold brought \$11,845 for a general average of \$348. The highest price paid for a bred heifer was \$475 received by Richard Schloisner, Jorssville, Ont., from M. H. Farms, Milliken, Ont., Chas. J. Smith, Fonthill, sold a four-year-old cow to Maurice McPherson, Fonthill at \$425 and Frank G. Stark Sons, also paid \$425 for a milking female.  
Among the big buyers of the day were A. Kalins, Laurel, Ont., and A. Dellala, Thorndale, each of whom bought five head. L. Nowry, Earlton, Ont. secured three head, two milking females and one bred heifer.  
Twenty milking females averaged \$377; 9 bred heifers \$347; 3 open heifers \$190, one heifer calf \$200 and one bull \$205.
