**Mrs. George H. Williams Was Widow of Minister**

Funeral service for Mrs. George H. Williams, who died at Inniswood Convalescent Home on Monday, July 7th, following an illness of one week, was held at Robinson's Funeral Parlours in Hamilton on Wednesday, July 9. Mrs. Williams, who had been residing in Barrie with her daughter, Mrs. Harris M. Redmond, for the past year and a half, died following an attack of coronary thrombosis.

Widow of the late Lt.-Col. George H. Williams, D.D., who predeceased her in April, 1945, the deceased had spent most of her married life doing church work as a United Church minister's wife. She was made a life member of the Women's Missionary Society in 1908, and was at one time president of the society.

In Barrie, she was a member of Collier Street United Church, the Women's Missionary Society and Woman's Association, and belonged to the Senior Citizen's Get-Together Club.

A native of Osgoore Vale, South Wales, where she was born on Jan. 14, 1873, the late Mrs. Williams was the former Gertrude Louise Adams. She lived at Hatley for three years, and in Bedford, P.Q., for three years. Her other places of residence included Delta, Ont., where she lived for three years; Juebec City, where she lived for four years; Winnipeg, where she was a resident for four years, and Toronto where she lived for eight years. She resided at Hamilton for 29 years before going to Barrie.

She is survived by four brothers, Arthur, Sydney, Haldane and Reginald, and a sister, Ethel, all in Great Britain; six sons, Dr. C. V. Williams, Georgetown; Dr. A. L. Williams and Dr. P. E. Williams, Hamilton; Bertram H. Williams and Dr. H. A. Williams, Toronto, and Rev. Ralph C. Williams, Espanola; and one daughter, Mrs. Harris M. Redmond (Edythe) Barrie. Also surviving are 18 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren. A son, Glyn, died in 1901.

The funeral service was conducted by Rev. Dr. Mutch Melrose of Hamilton. Pallbearers were the six sons of the deceased, Dr. C. V. Williams, Dr. A. L. Williams, Dr. P. E. Williams, Dr. H. A. Williams, Rev. R. C. Williams, and B. H. Williams. Interment was in Whitechapel Memorial Gardens, Hamilton.
