**Group Captain Harvey Moving to England**



Husband of a former Georgetown girl, Group Captain J. B. Harvey, AFC, CD, formed commanding officer of the RCAF Station Camp Borden, has assumed a new appointment as chief staff officer at Canadian Joint Services Headquarters, London, England. Since leaving Camp Borden he has been personnel staff officer at Trenton.

Mr. Harvey, 40, was born and educated in Winnipeg. He graduated from the University of Manitoba with a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1932. After post graduate work at the University of Toronto he joined the RCAF Auxiliary in Winnipeg and was commissioned to the permanent force a year later.

During the war he was on the staff of the Central Flying School at Trenton as a squadron commander and later commanded No. 2 Flying Instructors School at Vulcan, Manitoba. One of his most important appointments during World War was as commanding officer of No. 1 Service Flying Training School at Camp Borden.

Group Captain Harvey completed the RCAF Staff college course at Armour Heights, Toronto in 1945 and was later appointed commanding officer at Goose Bay, Labrador. In 1948 he journeyed to the United Kingdom and took the joint services staff college course, graduating in 1949.

Mr. Harvey organized the colours presentation ceremonies at Trenton during the visit of Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh. In 1951 he was a member of a special group which visited Japan and Korea.

He is married to the former Kathleen Grace Falls of Georgetown and Niagara Falls. Mrs. Harvey and their children, James 11, Peter 9 and Joan 3 accompanied him to England.
