

### Ballinfad Minister Is St. John's Guest Preacher

Rev. Wm. Gibb occupied the pulpit in St. John's United Church on Sunday morning, while Rev. John M. Smith was taking communion services for Mr. Gibb on the Ballinfad circuit.

Mr. Gibb used as his scripture lesson, the record in Luke 7, of

Jesus dining at the home of Simon the Pharisee, when a woman who was a sinner came in from the street, and stood behind Jesus weeping, began to wash His feet with her tears and wipe them with her hair, and then anointing them with ointment. She had evidently been forgiven much and was seeking an opportunity to show the love which had been born of that forgiveness, and was now growing and

developing into a desire for expression.

Simon the Pharisee thought that if Jesus was the prophet they expected, he would have known the nature of this woman and sent her away. But Jesus spoke to Simon and told him the parable of the two debtors, one owing 500 pence, the other 50, and when they could not pay, were frankly forgiven. Jesus asked Simon, "Tell me therefore which of them will love him most?" Simon answered cautiously, "I suppose that he, to whom He forgave most." Then Jesus drew Simon's attention to the comparative manner in which he had treated Jesus, how he had treated Him without the slightest eastern courtesy of water to wash His feet, had treated Him as an inferior, as the carpenter of Nazareth, whereas this woman, a great sinner, had not only washed His feet with her tears and dried them with her hair, but had anointed them with ointment, had lavished love upon Him and honored Him as at least a Prophet come from God.

Mr. Gibb used as his text, the question of Jesus to Simon, "Tell me therefore, which of them will love him most?" He went very clearly and deeply into the parable and showed how Jesus never left things on the surface, never just as they appeared to others, but even as we think of them ourselves, but delves deep down until He finds the hidden motive behind all our actions, behind even our thoughts, and we and what we do are judged accordingly. He saw the love of this woman was born of a great forgiveness and He appreciated it accordingly. Somewhere along the recent way of her life she had come across Jesus, and had instinctively felt a deep repentance and a great forgiveness, so that now, peace and love, and warmth were welling up in her every being. Simon felt no need of repentance or forgiveness, so his life was cold and hard, and he was floundering along in his own self-righteousness.

Mr. Gibb told the story from a recent novel, in which a mother had kept her love for her wayward son, while his sister, an organist in a

#### Outstanding Heifer for Holstein Breeders Raffle

Spruceleigh Monogram Doreen, a November born heifer calf is the animal selected from the herd of Ross Segsworth, Burlington, for the Halton Holstein Club lucky draw. We had an opportunity of seeing the heifer in question last week and frankly she is quite a heifer.

In our humble opinion she should give an outstanding account of herself at the Canadian National and also at the Milton show. She is a beautifully balanced heifer, with a good dairy rib and plenty of dairy temperament. And well she should be a good heifer, because she comes by it honestly. Her sire's dam was Spruceleigh Annabelle, that great show cow in the Segsworth herd. Nearly every Halton black and white enthusiast remembers Annabelle, the grand champion female at the Halton show of 1947 and 1948. Annabelle has two records between 18,000 and 20,000 lbs. on two times and altogether has produced well over 100,000 lbs. and is still going strong. Doreen's own mother is on her first lactation and is making a nice record. Her grand-dam has a number of splendid records including one as a 3-year old on 2X of 14,779 lbs. of milk and 574 lbs. of fat. Back of that is another 100,000 lb. cow so all in all Doreen is bred in the purple. We understand it took all of Lloyd Pickard's persuasive powers to pry Doreen out of the Segsworth herd and had it not been for Ross's interest in the Halton Club and Holstein generally, this outstanding heifer would never have been secured for the purpose. Needless to add if the lucky winner at 3:00 p.m. on September 27th at the Milton Fair prefers cash, Ross will be on deck with the "long green" to buy her back.
