Monday was another holiday with rain all day, for a total of 1.32 inches, which is the most for one day since the 24th of May holiday.

The month of July was slightly above normal — the maximum average being 83 which is 3 degrees above normal, and the minimum of 58, which is 2 degrees above normal. The rainfall also, was one quarter inch above the normal of 3.03 inches.
