Hockey, Ball Star Suffers Heart Attack

One of the district's best known sports stars, Joe Kentner died suddenly at his home in Acton on July 30th. He had attended a lacrosse game that night and succumbed to a heart attack shortly after returning home.

He starred for years on Acton hockey and baseball teams.

Born at Silvercreek 52 years ago, he was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Kentner. He spent his early years in Milton, moved to Acton 32 years ago and had worked for Beardmore & Co. since that time.

Surviving are his wife, Jessie Stuckley, two daughters, Mrs. Hartney Coles and Mrs. Kenneth Marchmont, four brothers and three sisters; Amos of Hamilton, John and Fred of Acton; Clarence of Toronto; Mrs. S. Evers of Toronto; Mrs. C. Connell, Burlington and Mrs. Don Herrington, Georgetown.

Rev. H. H. Price conducted the funeral service in St. Alban's Church and interment was in Fairview Cemetery, Acton. Pallbearers were Charles Townsley, Gordon Lambert, Frank Gibbons, Allan Kirkness, Bob Winton and Colin McGill. The flower bearers were Bob Anderson, Cliff Bradley, Freddie Kentner, Don Herrington, Ken Kentner and Ron Kentner, the latter four being nephews of the deceased.

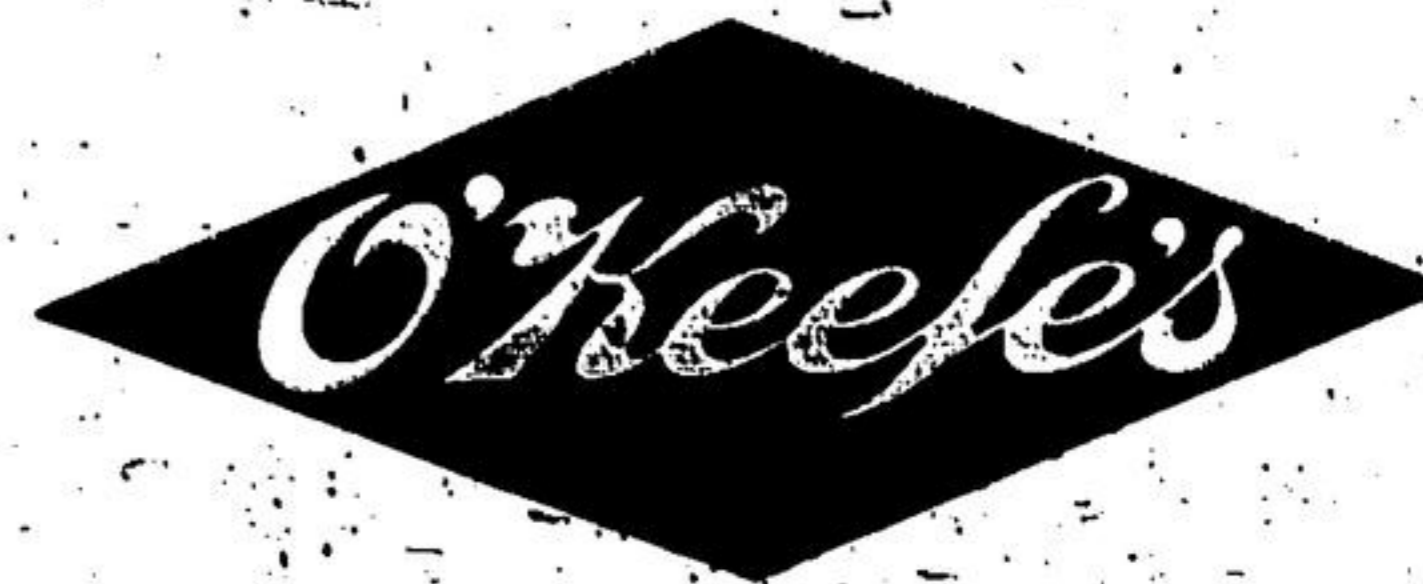
