

**HONEY CROP DOWN EXPECT PRICE UP**

The honey on your toast and peaches is going to cost you more. This became apparent today, when cross country crop reports compiled by the Ontario Beekeepers Association were read at the Board of Directors meeting.

The Ontario crop will be, it is estimated, no more than ten million pounds, or about half of last year's crop. County after county which last year produced hundreds of thousands of pounds of this food of the Ancient Gods, is this year reporting no honey at all, or at the most hardly enough to take care of local demand. Other counties, notably in the area of Simcoe and Grey and the Ottawa Valley, are reporting satisfactory returns.

The picture from Western Canada is about the same. Saskatchewan-Manitoba Beekeepers are expecting a very short crop. This Western honey along with honey produced in Alberta, where a fair crop is expected, will it is believed, do little more than satisfy the demand in Western Canada.

In view of the above, it is felt that a considerable strengthening in honey prices is inevitable.

An enjoyable afternoon was held at the Community Park at Lowville last Wednesday when Halton Women's Institutes held their first annual picnic.

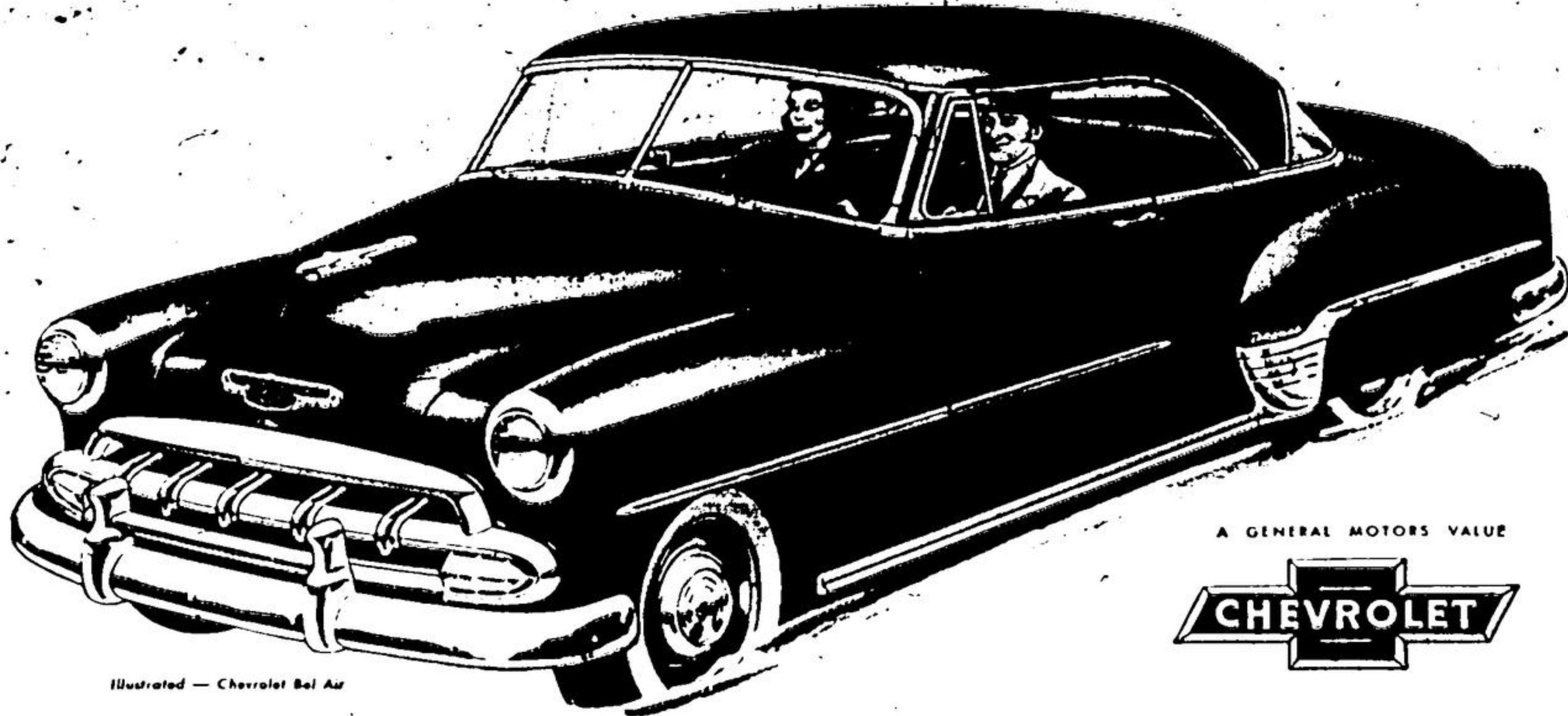
