4-IN-A-ROW FAILS LORNE SCOTS FAIL TO PLACE AT ONE

A three year record of first prize at the Exhibition was shattered for the Lorne Scots Band last Thursday.

With high hopes the band left town in the morning to compete in the higher Section I against bands from London, Welland and Hamilton. The Owen Sound City Band originally entered decided later to withdraw from competition. For the previous three years, the Lorne Scots have taken first prize in Section 2, and numerous prizes in the 3 years before that.

However, this year the judges awarded first prize to London Tenth Concert Band led by A. J. Ford with a marking score of 259. The 57th L.A.A. Regt. Band, Welland, placed second with 241, RCAF 424th (Reserve) Squadron from Hamilton third with 231, and the Lorne Scots were in last place with 225 1/2.

The Lorne Scots were well received by the large crowd of music lovers who listened to the competition, in fact if applause were the judge, they might have placed higher in the standing. A bright note for the local men was when Capt. Dick Hayward who composed the test piece "Zingari" approached Bandmaster Alf Perrott just as the Lorne Scots were leaving the stand complimented him on a fine performance and remarked "That was the way I wrote it to be played". Old Panama March was the other selection used by the Lorne Scots.

HONEY HARBOUR VACATION MARRED BY TRAGIC DROWNING

A Georgetown boy, William Ernest Coffell, 3 was drowned at Honey Harbour early Friday evening.

Little Willy had been on vacation with his mother and other members of the family at Roberts' Island, where her mother Mrs. D. Bourdon, of Toronto has a summer cottage. The accident occurred shortly after his father, Jim Coffell, had arrived to spend the week-end and to bring the family home to Georgetown. While supper was being prepared the little boy was nosed, and a search instituted. His body was found in shallow water and it is believed that he had fallen from a dock while using a fishing pole which his dad had made for him. Nearby the pole was floating with a sunfish on the hook.

Mr. Coffell applied artificial respiration for more than an hour, along with a nearby cottager, Dr. K. E. Perfect, Toronto.

Billy is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jim Coffell, an older brother, Lorne James, 6 and two sisters, Lynn Ann Patricia, 4 and Barbara June who was one year older the day of his death. His father is an electrician at the A. V. Roe plant at Malton and his mother is the former Madeline Pettit of Toronto. The family lives at 7 Churchill Crescent.

Archdeacon W. G. O. Thompson, conducted the funeral service on Monday at the McClure Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Mr. D. Bourdon, William Cairns and John Heinz of Toronto and an uncle, Gordon Browne.

GIRL INJURED, CAR WRECKED TURNS OVER ON NORVAL HILL

A Georgetown girl was injured, and a car owned by Ronald Avery, Erin, was badly wrecked in an accident on the west Norval hill on Sunday night.

The car, proceeding from Georgetown, was driven by Fred Tarzwell, 20 of Erin, and went out of control just as it headed down the hill and turned over in the ditch. Myrna Crawford, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Crawford, Normandy lived a passenger in the car received injuries to her shoulder and was taken by ambulance to hospital in Guelph after being attended at the scene by Dr. R. T. Paul. She was released from hospital Monday night.

Shortly after the accident occurred, Ken McMillan drove by and noticed the car in the ditch. He found Miss Crawford in the car, with her ankle jammed between the seat and the dashboard hanging upside down, being supported by the driver. Other motorists stopped and were able to extricate her from the wreck.

Liquor Store Manager Former Town Assessor

Manager of the Georgetown Liquor Control Board store and Georgetown's first full-time assessor, Major J. Arnott Early, E.D. died at Sunnybrook Hospital on Friday morning after an operation.

Major Early served overseas with the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry from 1939 until 1945 transferring to the regiment from the Lorne Scots shortly after the outbreak of war. On his return to Canada he was appointed assessor for the town, relinquishing this position three years ago to become liquor store manager.

Eldest son of the late Philip and Maria Early, descendants of Norval pioneers, he attended Norval Public School and Georgetown High School. He was past president of Branch 120, Canadian Legion, a prominent Progressive Conservative, having held office as ward chairman in town for many years, and a member of the county executive, and a Mason. He had lived in Georgetown for 25 years and was a member of Knox Presbyterian Church.

Dr. Sayers Secretary Of New Organization

Dr. Charles Sayers, Georgetown, has been named secretary of a newly formed group of district veterinarians. Membership in the Mid-Ontario Veterinary Association comprises an area bordered by the towns and cities of Walkerton, Warton, Owen Sound, Orillia, Newmarket, Georgetown and Maple.

Nineteen veterinarians, accompanied by their wives, assembled at Park Hotel, Owen Sound, recently for an inaugural meeting at which Dr. R. Williams, Orangeville, was named president. Other officers include: Dr. Trenayne Behan, Orillia vice president, Dr. J. Shephard, Maple treasurer, Dr. L. Scauett, Chesley, Dr. M. R. Knox, Owen Sound and Dr. C. Hyatt, of Warton, executive committee.

Driving a Milton Milling Company truck, the accident victim was on his way to pick up a load of hay. He was thrown from the truck and landed underneath it when it left the road, hit a four-foot ditch and a pole.

Sclizal had been in Canada 18 months. His parents are in Italy. He was a nephew of John Sclizal and J. Nova, Milton, and a cousin of Detroit Red Wings hockey player Enjo Sclizal.
