A man who was elected mayor of Acton but never served officially in this capacity, Thomas W. R. Salmon died Thursday.

Mr. Salmon was elected mayor last December, defeating former mayor Ted Tyler. A few days after his election he suffered a heart attack and was forced to resign the office which he would have assumed in January. Later in a by-election, the present mayor, Ben Rachlin was chosen by the electors.

Mr. Salmon is survived by his wife, Annie Cooke and seven children, Thomas of Toronto, Ethel of Erin, Mrs. Harry Watkins of Milton, Benjamin of Guelph, Rev. Reuben Salmon, Diocese of Huron, Robin of Stratford and Mrs. Wallace Longstreet of Erin. Mrs. Watkins is a former Georgetown resident as is Rev. Reuben Salmon, who attended Georgetown High School.

Interment was made in Erin Cemetery on Saturday after requiem mass in St. Joseph's R.C. Church, Acton.

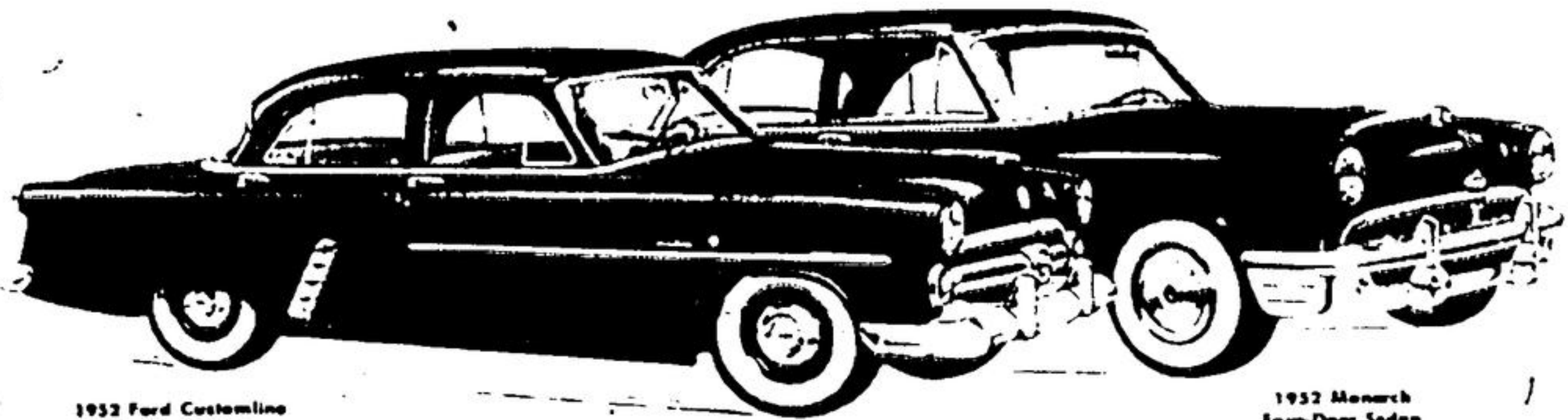
