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BRIGADE QUELLS FIRE FURNITURE DAMAGED

Fire in an upstairs apartment of a Wesleyan Street home caused several hundred dollars' damage on Friday morning.

The fire broke out shortly before noon in Mr. and Mrs. Eric Tomlinson's apartment in the house which has just recently been purchased from John Kennedy by William Lyons. Cause of the fire has not been determined. The apartment had been empty for several hours. Mr. and Mrs. Tomlinson having gone to their work at the Smith & Stone plant at seven a.m.

The fire brigade entered the room through a window, and had the blaze under control in a few minutes. Damaged in the fire were a chest-of-drawers, rug, end table, curtains and bedding. Though not much water was used to quell the blaze, there was some damage downstairs too, as water ran down the walls.

Mr. and Mrs. Lyons had just moved into their new home last week and Mr. and Mrs. Tomlinson were preparing to move out of their apartment soon. Mr. Lyons came here from Cheltenham district where he had farmed all his life on the homestead which was farmed by his father before him. The farm has been purchased by Clare Hutchinson.

Streetsville Minister Preaches at St. John's

Worship in St. John's United Church on Sunday morning was a joint service with Knox Presbyterian, the guest minister being Rev. Lloyd Stapleton of Streetsville.

Mr. Stapleton used much of the Old Testament, and an epistle of Peter in the New Testament as his Scripture lessons, pointing out the necessity of spiritual living as well as the physical. He took his text from Matthew 4:4. "Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God." He showed that these words teach us a great truth of life, how that health and physical well-being though very desirable, are not of themselves sufficient to make a full or complete life, but a life must have also, spiritual food, exercise and development through every word and every teaching of God and through every personal experience of Him. Only so can life be abundant and the more so as the emphasis is placed on the spiritual for one could be poor in body, yet so rich in lasting spiritual values. That life would be still worthwhile, whereas on the other hand physical well-being without spiritual foundation and support, could soon be sapped away by stress and strain, leaving life empty and withered.

Why do we go to church? Is it not so that we can hear God's words for us, through praise and prayer, and through the words, meditation and direction of the minister of God? How can we hear them? The world is full of words, spoken, written, over the radio, everywhere, and God's words too, but if we hurry through life, busy with only our own affairs, then we will only hear the noise and buzz, what we want to hear we only hear when we stop and listen. And if we want to hear God's word for us, then we must truly stop and listen.

Nor is that all. God is anxious that others should be fed by His word, and many can only be reached through us, so as we go out into the work-week and into the community, we must pass on to others through our words and actions. His words for them, so that their lives may be spiritually fed and made more abundant. And further, still, we must watch our opportunity of spreading His word to other lands, it will reach to every land and every tongue, and all shall share in His love and abundant blessings.

Mr. Stapleton gave the boys and girls four good lessons from a pin, an ordinary everyday pin he took from his lapel:

1. Be straight. A crooked pin is not wanted and is usually thrown away. God and people want boys and girls who are straight, true and upright.
2. Be shiny. A rusty pin is of little use. God wants us to be cheerful and bright, letting our light shine before men.
3. Use your head. A pin without a head wouldn't help very much. God wants boys and girls to be thoughtful, considerate of others, using their heads to develop their lives wisely and well.
4. Be like a pin and have a point
