

Rent Controls Stay Here Other Towns Drop Them

Rent controls will be removed from 77 per cent of Ontario municipalities on March 2nd, unless the municipal councils concerned ask the controls to be kept.

Travel and Publicity Minister Cecilie announced last week that the provincial rentals committee had forwarded a list of 708 municipalities to be decontrolled and 215

on which controls will remain. Six of Halton's ten municipalities, including Georgetown, have asked that rent controls be kept on. Decontrol will be brought about in Acton, Esquamest, Nasagaweya and Bronte unless the municipal councils concerned ask, within six months, to be included in the control area.

The decontrol move came as a all-party select committee of the legislature.

Previously the committee had written to the 923 Ontario municipalities asking their views on rent control. Georgetown Council, by motion at a meeting after the letter was received, indicated their belief that controls should remain in Georgetown.

Biggest surprise of the announcement is that Leaside, Forest Hill, Port Credit and Pickering have requested removal of controls. The remainder of the Greater Toronto area will remain under controls for an indefinite period.

In neighbouring counties, Guelph, Brampton, Hamilton, Dundas and Toronto Township are among those who will be keeping rent control.
