APPROVE MALTON ROAD PAVING

Despite strenuous opposition from several council members, Peel County council has approved the construction of a paved highway from the four corners in Malton easterly to the York County boundary. The road, which will run for a mile and a half in Peel will cost the county about \$25,000.

Paving of the total six mile stretch will cost \$650,000. The cost will be born by Avro paying up to \$250,000, Peel and York counties and the province. It will ease congestion on other roads bearing heavy traffic from Avro into Toronto.

Objectors to the plan did not favour the county paying money to construct roads to a defence plant and that it should be a federal matter.

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
