

To Straighten Section
No. 10 Highway

A dangerous section of highway south of Brampton is to be fixed. The section of No. 10 from Brampton town limits to the Yellow Birch will have dangerous curves eliminated and blind grades removed. Beamish Construction of Toronto, will be starting work on the project shortly.

The bumpy, twisty stretch of highway runs along the B. H. Bull and Sons farm and the reconstruction calls for purchase of considerable private property along the right of way. No detouring will be necessary as the contract will be handled so that half the road allowance can be used at all times.

The new road will come rather close to the gatehouse on the Bull property. There will be 22 feet of pavement with a 36-foot dimension from shoulder to shoulder.

There have been two traffic fatalities on this stretch of highway in the last two years and numerous persons have been injured in accidents.
