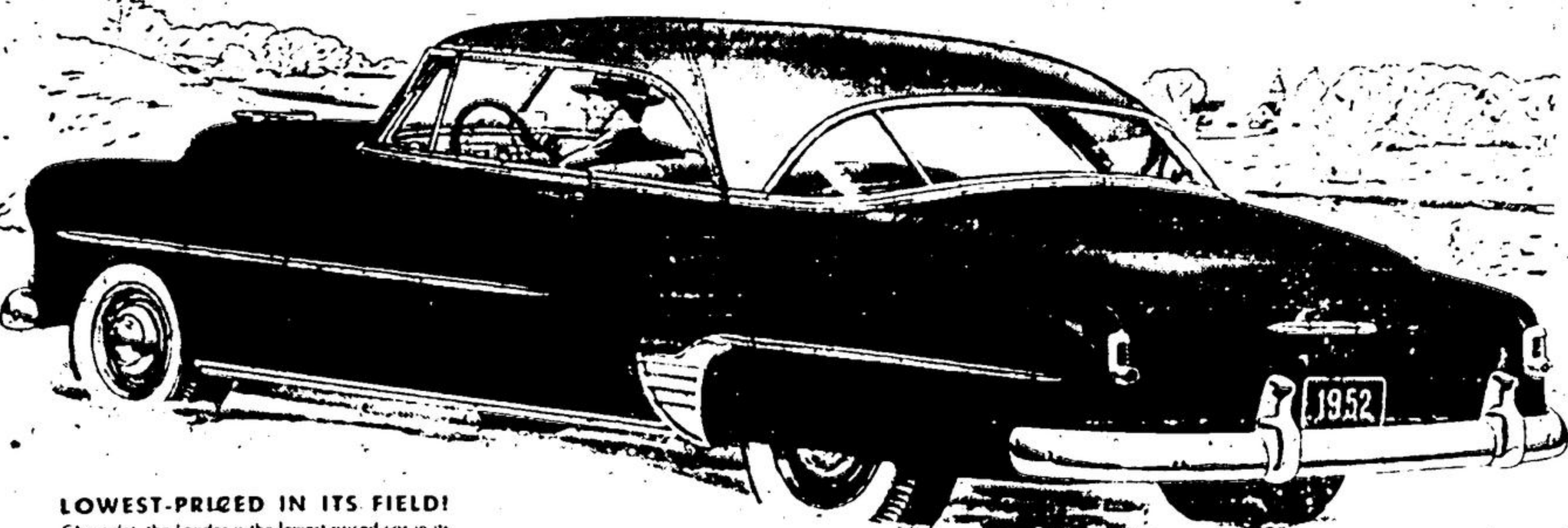




REV. C. DWIGHT POWELL, B.A., B.D.

THREE WIN PRIZES IN BAND LUCKY DRAW

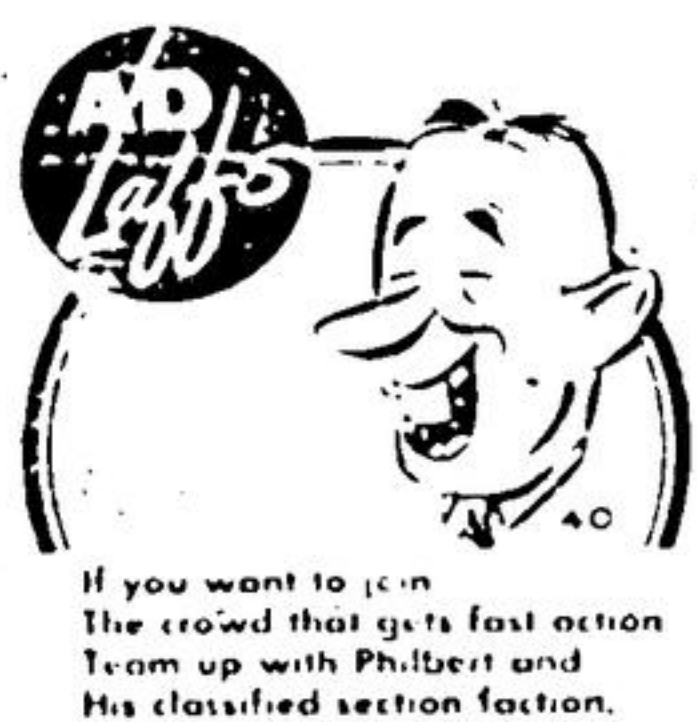

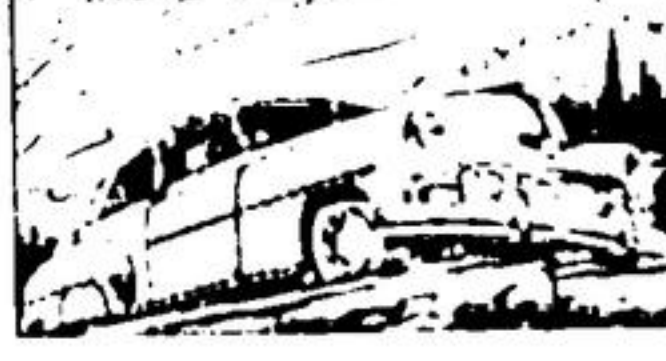
