we pay the price for a ticket to Tarsus, and what a price it turns out to be. But if our response is, "Ye Lord," we still have the price to pay, but what a glory and victory it brings with it. Mr. Smith challenged the congregation to heed God's confronting and to be ready with the response, "Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do?"

The morning anthem was "Still, Still with Thee," Mrs. E. G. Bishop taking the solo part. Albert Todd sang the solo, "Ye Must Be Born Again."

At the evening service in the church parlour, Mr. Smith based his meditation on the answer of Jesus to the questions of Nicodemus, as recorded in John chapter 3. God gave us His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life. Mr. Smith gave a broad clear outline of the basis of our faith. He told how even the greatest of our scientists were awed at the vastness, yet preciseness of the workings of God's natural and physical laws throughout the Universe making cosmos, rather than chaos, which could so easily be, and so helping to confirm our belief in God, not only as Creator of all things, but also as sustainer of His whole creation with a plan for the world that would have meant man living in harmony with his God, and with his fellowmen.

"GOD CONFRONTS US" IS SERMON TOPIC

At St. John's United Church on Sunday morning, Rev. John M. Smith chose for his subject "God Confronting Us."

His Scripture lesson was the story of Paul being confronted by God, on the way to Damascus, as told in Acts, chapter 9 and Paul's response, "Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do?" Mr. Smith told of Moses, fleeing from justice from the wrath of Pharaoh in Egypt, leaving the children of Israel in bondage and slavery, and tending the flocks of Jethro in Midian, in quietness and peace, with plenty of time to meditate on the plight of his own people in Egypt, and his responsibility to them; then God confronting him with the task of freeing them. A tremendous task, which made Moses hesitate and protest his inability, but with God's promise that He would be with him, responding and succeeding. Paul was on his way to Damascus to persecute the Christians, when God confronted him, saying "Saul, Saul, why persecutest thou me?" Paul's response was almost immediate, "Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do?" the words of Mr. Smith's text.

John Wesley, discouraged in love and with his inability to move the people of England by his own theology, was confronted by God in the back seat of a Moravian mission into which he had wandered and came away in response with a heart full of warm love and compassion for God's creatures, high or low estate, and moved them to repentance and service for God.

And so, down through the ages, literally millions of times, has God confronted his people, through the spoken word, through His Book, our Bible; in the quiet places like Moses, but also in the busy places of work or play, and as with Moses, Paul, John, Wesley and many multitudes, God's word has been compelling and the response has been immediate and affirmative. They saw the vision of work to be done for God, and knew His power would be sufficient to sustain them and carry them through even though it meant sacrifice and fulfilment.

How about our Stewardship? God is still confronting us with His work to be done, and His voice is still compelling, yet we have the choice of saying "Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do?" or "Not just yet, Lord, I am busy; when I am through." If no, then like Jonah when he was told to go to Nineveh,

But somehow man has always wanted to follow his own inclinations and wander away from God's plan, repenting a while, then wandering again while prophets and seers, men of God knew that it could not continue so forever, but that God would do something about it. And He did, not quite exactly as foretold, but nearly so, God visiting the earth in the person of His only begotten Son, Jesus Christ, who through His teaching, His life, and death on the cross, has shown the loving nature of God, and His great desire to bring His creatures back into full harmony with Himself. Many have accepted His way and come back to follow Him faithfully and steadfastly to the end. What does Christ's life, and death, and resurrection mean to you? Is Christ nothing to you? Are you accepting the blessings that have come to you and to the world through Him, without any care about Christ Himself, is Christ nothing to you? Or is Christ something to you and if so, what? A good man, a great teacher, someone whose example of living is worth following. Or is He as he should be, is Christ everything to you? Lord, Master Saviour, Friend, Only so can you be fitting into God's plan, for you and for the world, a plan of harmony with Him and His laws, of peace and goodwill, a world as you would wish it to be. Is Christ everything to you?
